Your favor of list，at hand，enclosing your report to Feb．28th，We are pleased to learn that you are succeeding so nicely．On March list，our meeting of directors adjourned again to the 15 th ，on which date we will act upon your appointment of Trustee＇s Executive Committee and Advisory Board．
Everything is moving along smoothly at this end：have just sold $\$ 80$ ， worth of hogs．And will have the land all rented in a few days． I enclose a letter f from Mr．Henry L．Underwood Manager of the Harrogate Land Co．，which partially explains itself． The strip of land refered to is situated just in front of the site of the Four Seasons Hotel；between the site and the state diam road．If Mr．Myers is there he will tell you where it is，and how important it is to secure it．I think there are from ten to twelve acres in the tract．We made a verbal contract for this land in 1897；But on account of scarcity of funds to make the cash payment the deal was not closed．

Referring to conversation over the telephone today I beg to state, the last data which we find in regard to the proposed xxx sale of strip of land belonging to the Harrogate Land Company is dated Aug. 6th, 1897, in which Mr. Johnson as Secretary of this Company stated that the titles to both plats should be fully investigated before making deed. It was the intention that this property should be sold to the Lincoln Memorial University of Cumberland Gap, Tenn. and the terms then mentioned were $\$ 35.00$ per acre one-third cash, balance in one and two years from date at $6 \%$ interest. Also memorandum stating that the cost of surveying made, which by the way I think has been accomplished, should be equally divided between the purchaser andthis Company. Such a long time has elapsed, and the University did not see fit to embrace the opportunt then offered, it will be necessary for me to take the max matter up at once with the London office before giving a definite answer to your inquiry as to what we are willing to do.

Mr. Hall called on me a few days ago in your behalf and wished me to be one of ten to give $\$ 1000$ to clear the Lincoln Memorial University at Cumberland Gap. I told him I would write you in a few days after considering the matter. You may put me down for $\$ 1000$ when you get the other nine. This I understand will clear the property of all encumbrances. He also told me that you were going to endeavor to raise $\$ 100,000$ as an endowment of the University. If you can succeed in that, I will give $\$ 5000$ towards that, of course providing that the other $\$ 95,000$ be raised. It will only take twenty to make up this endowment. I think you ought to have a still larger endowment, but perhaps to start on $\$ 100,000$ is all you are warranted in doing.

# Constitution of the Jackson County Veteran Association. 

## PREAMBLE.

In order to promote the preservation of those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together with the strong cords of love and affection the comrades in arms of many battles, sieges, marches and cruises, the Soldiers and Sailors of the Union Army and Navy during the War of the Rebellion, do form and adopt this constitution.

## CONSTITUTION.

## ARTICLE $1 .-\mathrm{NAME}$.

This organizatian shall be known as the Jackson County Veteran Association of Jackson County, Iowa.

## ARTICLE II,-OF MEMBERSHIP

Sec 1. Soldiers and Sailors who were regularly mustered into the service of the United States during the War of the Rebellion and honorably discharged, shall become members of the Association upon signifying their desire to do so; Provided, that enrollment of a person who has been convicted of crime or is notoriously of immoral character, may be deferred by a majority vote until the Association is satisfied that he has reformed.
Sec. 2. Membership can be terminated only by death; but for crime or other conduct unbecoming a comrade, a member may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Association at a meeting of which every member shall have been notified. A suspended member may be reinstated by a two-thirds vote of a meeting of which all members shall have had notice.

ARTICLE III.-OFPICERS.
The officers of the Association shall consisist of a Commander, Sr. and Jr. Vice Commanders, Adjutant Quartermaster, Commissary Color Sergeant, and Chaplain, who shall be chosen by ballot by a majority vote of the Association, and hold their offices for one year or until their successors are duly installed. Officers of the Day, Officers of the Guard, Guards, Orderlies and such other officers as may be necessary for the transaction of business, may be detailed by the Commander from time to time as required.

## ARTICLE IV.-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. For occasions of parade, ceremony or drill, the powers and duties of the officers shall assimilate to regimental rank in the U. S. Army; and they shall be obeyed and respected accordingly.

Sec. 2. For the transaction of business and other purposes of the Association:

1. The duties of the Commander shall be essentially those of a presiding officer.
2. The duties of the Vice Commanders shall be those
usually devolving upon vice presidents, and they shall take precedence in order of rank.
3. The duties of the Adjutant shall be essentially those of the secretary. He shall be the historian of the Association and shall carefully arrange and preserve all records, writings and other data, pertaining to the War of the Rebellion, that may be given him by members of the Association and others for that purpose.
4. The Quartermaster shall perform the duties usually appertaining to a treasurer and shall have general supervision of all accounts and disbursements.
5. The Commissary shall have general supervision of arrangements for banquets or picnics of the Association, and perform such other duties as the Association or Commander may require.
6. The Color Sergeant shall have charge of such flags, badges, uniforms, decorations and other property (except money and books) that the Association may become possessed of.

Members of the Association shall be known and hailed is "Comrades."
ARTICLE V.-OF MEETINGS.

The Association hold an annual meeting or reunion at a place designated by vote of the Association. The date of such reunion shall be decided by the officers of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.-OF FUNDS.
The expenses of the Association shall be defrayed by voluntary contributions and the sale of badges at the annual reunions.

## ARTICLE VII. OF REMOVALS.

If a member of this Assoctation should remove from Jackson County, he will cease to be an active member and need not be notified of meetings, but such members will be expected to provide that this Association be informed of the date of their death for preservation in the records.

ARTICLE VIII.
When the membership of this Association shall have become reduced, by death and removal, to a number too few to keep up its organization and care for its records and property, all such records and memorials shall be deposited with the Adjutant General's Department of the State of Iowa, or with a historical society of Iowa or Jackson county, as may then be deemed best. Such records and memorials shall be under control of members of this Association so long as one survives, provided they shall not be removed from the State of lowa.

ARTICLE IX.-AMENDMENTS.
This constitution may be amended at the regular annual meeting of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

4. The Quartermaster shall perform the duties usually appertaining to a treasurer and shall have general supervision of all accounts and disbursements.
5. The Commissary shall have general supervision of arrangements for banquets or pienics of the Association, and perform such other duties as the Association or Commander may require.
6. The Color Sergeant shall have charge of such flags, badges, uniforms, decorations and other property (except money and books) that the Association may become possessed of.
Members of the Association shall be known and hailed as "Comrades."

> Article v-of meetings.

The Association hold an annual meeting or reunion at a place designated by vote of the Association. The date of such reunion shall be decided by the officers of the Association.
article vi.-of funds.
The expenses of the Association shall be defrayed by voluntary contributions and the sale of badges at the annual reunions.

## article vil.-of removals.

If a member of this Assoctation should remove from Jackson County, he will cease to be an active member and need not be notified of meetings, but such members will be expected to provide that this Association be informed of the date of their death for preservation in the records.
article viii.
When the membership of this Association shall have become reduced, by death and removal, to a number too few to keep up its organization and care for its records and property, all such records and memorials shall be deposited with the Adjutant General's Department of the State of Iowa, or with a historical society of Iowa or Jackson county, as may then be deemed best. Such records and memorials shall be under control of members of this Association so long as one survives, provided they shall not be removed from the State of Iowa.
article ix.-AMENDMENTS.
This constitution may be amended at the regular annual meeting of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
