My dear General,

I have received your letter of the 1st inst., and am very glad to get word from you: You are, probably aware, that I have been quite sick for the last few months. I went over to London, at the suggestion of my sister, and Bishop Hartzell. Had a splendid trip going over, felt proud of the stars and stripes floating over the Paris; stayed in London 7 days, three of them in bed, and I did not see the sunshine more than about 15 minutes while I was there. I came back on the German boat called the Saale, was 10 days coming over, slept 7 of them sick in a bunk, and was mighty glad to see the stars and stripes and the Yankee soil of New York. I started on the 4th day of Jan., got to Southampton on the 11th, and left for London immediately, and left London to return on the 13th. I was 10 days returning, and got back here on the 23th of Jan.

Bishop Hartzell told me that he had had a conversation with you and he thought it would be well to have Mr. Hurd push the suits for you and him, which is entirely agreeable to me, as Mr. Hurd is a pretty good lawyer.

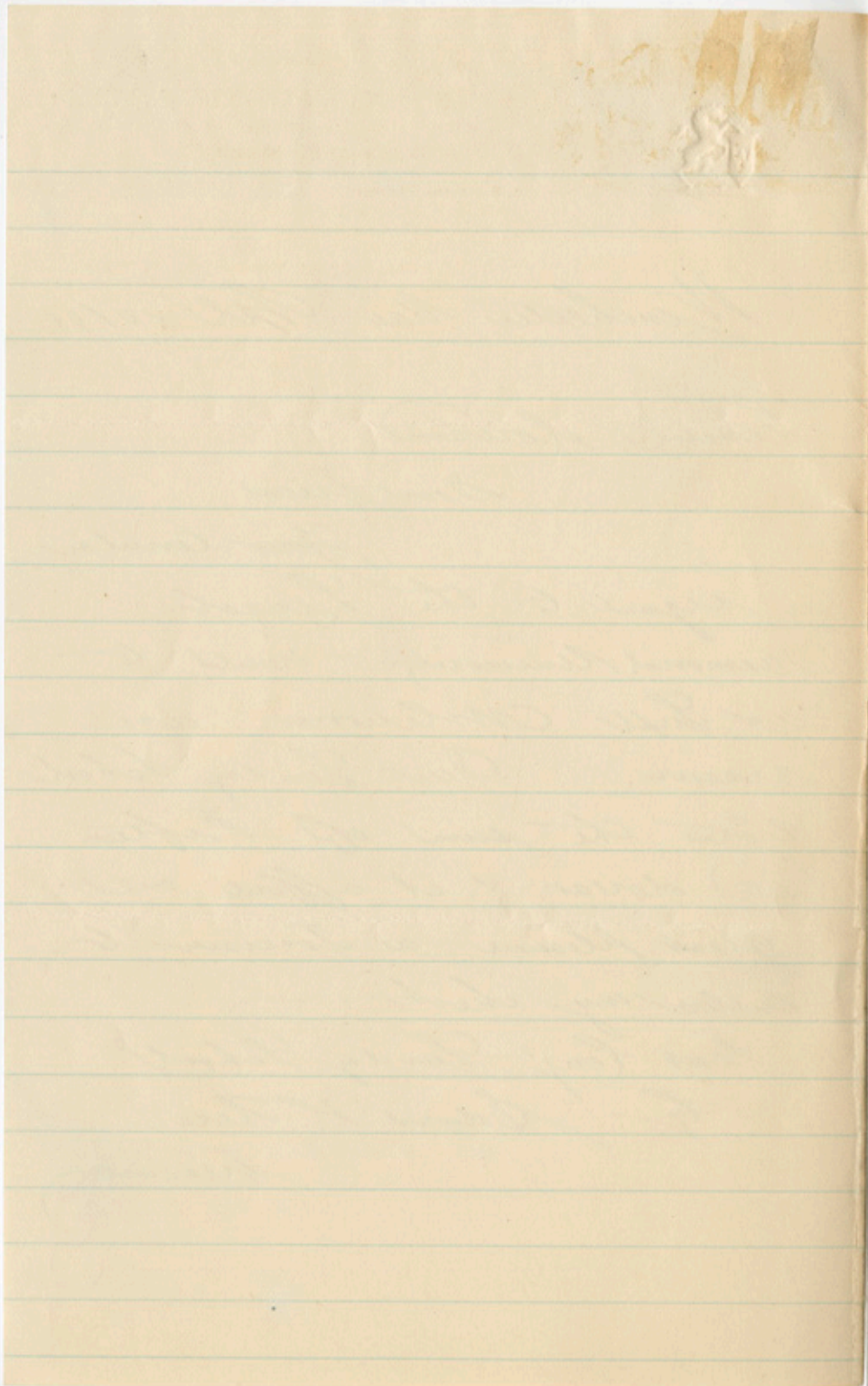
