With the assistance of a friend I have several sets of tools for this purpose. The girls have been learning to sew by hand and now I want to teach them to work the machine.

A good woman in Philadelphia has offered to send \$100⁰⁰ to keep the school going sometime longer if the colored people themselves will raise another hundred. I do not see how it is possible for them to do this. The wages of laboring men here are \$5⁰⁰ per month and their rations which are often insufficient for their wives also. When a man has to clothe himself and his wife, feed and clothe his children, bought medicine and paid something to the doctor, he cannot have anything left from this amount. A woman earns still lower wages, except those who take in washing.

I want very much to see the school continued for two or three months longer with industrial features and also with the common school branches, so I have concluded to ask you whether you would be willing to give the hundred dollars which my friend wants the colored people to give as a condition for her assistance
