Dear General Howard:

As you are aware, the American Board at its Grand Rapids meeting appointed the above Committee to launch and conduct a Forward Movement in Foreign Missions. The Committee has formulated a plan of operations, engaged a Special Representative, Mr. Luther D. Wishard of New York, for many years identified with the Christian movement among students, and has inaugurated a campaign whose first stage consists in an appeal to selected churches which are believed to be able to assume the entire salary of a missionary. The record of the first four months more than meets our most sanguine expectations. Our Special Representative has visited seventeen churches whose aggregate resident membership is 7349. Last year these churches gave \$4194. aside from the gifts of the women through the Women's Boards. This year they have pledged \$13,575. or an increase of over two hundred per cent. These increased pledges have been made with the full expectation of their annual renewal. Every church which Mr. Wishard has visited has assumed the full salary of a missionary and every Sunday promises to be filled for a long time to come. We believe there are not less than 600 churches which are as well able to provide salaries as many of those which have already done so. If this is true, it is evident that the Board has at length found a method which will eventually yield a largely increased permanent income.

Your Committee is also inaugurating several other lines of work which have been followed with excellent effects by other Boards. The results of these will be reported to you from time to time. We have asked Mr. Wishard to prepare a statement of the principles and methods of the Forward Movement. You will find these in his booklet which he is sending you entitled "The Students' Challenge to the Churches". We bespeak for it your careful perusal.

The only shadow upon the outlook is the deficit, of \$40,000 carried over from last year, and a further threatened deficit of \$60,000 for this year occasioned by the serious shrinkage in legacies. We cannot truly enter upon a Forward Movement until the present necessary annual expenses are provided for. If the increased interest shown by a few churches and friends could be felt by all, the needed funds would be speedily provided. To secure this increased interest will require the united efforts of every friend of the American Board.

It seems to us that this is a time of emergency when we may properly appeal to the Corporate Members of the Board for their co-opera-

If the increased interest shown by a few churches and friends could be felt by all, the needed funds would be speedily provided. To secure this increased interest will require the united efforts of every friend of the American Board.

It seems to us that this is a time of emergency when we may properly appeal to the Corporate Members of the Board for their co-operation.

tion. Some may be able to increase their personal gifts. Others may secure special contributions from their friends less informed and interested than themselves in the work of the Board. Those who are pastors may ask for a special card collection from their church or better still, ask personal gifts from a selected list of members.

It appears to the Committee that the following considerations justify the appeal for your personal co-operation at this time.

1.-- The Forward Movement has already met with such favor as to justify the belief that we are on the highway to a greatly enlarged income and work and that we are to be permanently delivered from the annual deficit, whose incessant appeal has almost worn out the patience of the churches.

2.-- The Forward Movement must be freed from the drag-net of debt in order to become a vital force.



3.-- If we can signalize the first year of the Forward Movement by meeting our annual expenses and clearing the debt, enthusiasm will be awakened throughout the entire denomination and a confidence will be created which will carry everything before it.

In view of these considerations, we earnestly appeal to you to secure in any one of the ways suggested, or in other ways which may occur to you such an amount as you are able and send the same to the Treasurer, Mr. Frank H. Wiggin, Boston, Mass. not later than July 15th. If you will do this you will thus put the Board in a position to grapple effectively with the population of a hundred million heathen who are mainly dependent upon the Congregational Churches of North America for the Gospel. We should be glad to hear from you at your earliest convenience as to what you think of this proposition and what you are willing to undertake to do.
