I still hope you may come by way of Chicago on your return, but write because there is some urgency as to time in a matter I wanted to mention to you. Harry N. Culver, son of Morton, I think spoke to you, and perhaps you know something, of his military record, which I enclose. He has always been an upright boy and good citizen in Glencoe, and is thirty-three years old. He wants a commission in the new volunteers that are now to be raised. Is modest enough to ask only for position of second lieutenant, though he has been for ten years or more, as you see, in the Illinois National Guards, and had come up through the different grades from private to second lieutenant, and volunteered when the lst Ill. Inf. was re-orgenized to go to Cuba and was commissioned second lieutenant. He did good service at Santiago and came home with the regiment, and has the commendation of all his oflicers. Enclosed is Ofy a Ietter I have just written for Senator Cullom. I think he will endorse it favorably and return to me. Now, I would like, if you are willing, to either have an independent letter from you that Harry could forward with his papers to the Secretary of War, or, if you very much prefer it, I will forward the letter after getting the Senator's endorsement, onor,

There is this objection to that, that the Senator may be away from home, or he may not be willing to endorse the application so much out of his range politically since Senator Mason resides here in Chicago. I do not know Senator Mason, but think Harry will obtain sone good endorsement from him also on a separate paper.
