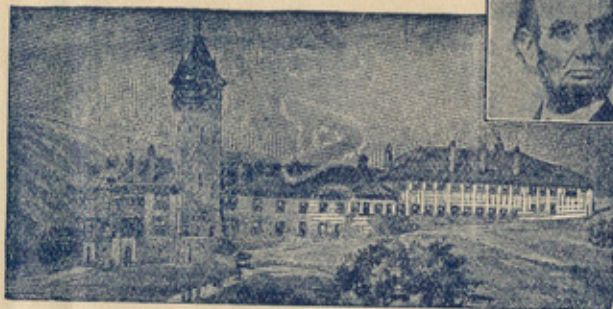

I can expect in a coat of salary

Please allow me to make
 a preliminary answer to your
 valued letter of Sept. 30th just
 come into my hands. I have
 been absent for several weeks;
 hence the delay of my answer.

Nobody valued Mr & Mrs Meyers
 more than I. I took hold when
 the great need came. I advised
 the present enlargement of the
 Cumberland Valley work to "Lincoln
 Memorial". All the Mountain
 Herald means is that we secure
 our plant by 1000. more of sub-
 scriptions. Every body about us

understands that the instant the debt is paid & the property free of mortgage, we have promise of considerable endowment, & that we need a large amount \$2000, or beside to make our group of Departments all we want. To this end I am working night & day & without pay (bearing my own expenses).

Mr Meyers seems strange since this dear wife's departure. He cannot keep accounts. Eager's are magnificently kept. Mr Meyers insisted on withdrawing. He begged to have his name left off the Board of Directors. He forbade the name to be published in our financial Circular. Just as soon as he starts out as financial Agent (for he is one by the vote of the Board) he will do as he has done, take his expenses out of what

he raises. (3) As to salary, we will pay him a salary as soon as we have the funds. The Board pays Mr Eager for actual work, if Mr Meyers could & would do

that work (and I know the value of it), the Board would willingly pay him. If we pay too much for system, financial responsibility, books perfectly kept & the work of supervision, it will be remedied at the next meeting. You could not do it for less. Pray remember that while Bro. Meyers is noble & unselfish, he is sometimes ^{strangely} ~~discouraging~~.

I was obliged to repair the Harrow School building. His wife's sister, is utterly different from Mrs Allen Meyers, and her husband, useful as he is, has caused us much trouble.
