Dear General Howard, -

I have given very much thought to your request to give the Lincoln Memorial University a financial lift at this particular time, and I regret to say that, after most careful consideration, I have been forced to the conclusion that we cannot afford to comply. Our charity account is now overdrawn upwards of \$40,000, and in self-defense it became necessary for us, sometime ago, to restrict our payments as nearly as possible to the amount of money received for the various benevolences presented in our columns.
