

My dear Dr. Pearson:--

I had the pleasure of lunching a day or two ago with Gen. O.O. Howard and Dr. Gray. The General handed me the enclosed circular regarding Lincoln Memorial University; indeed, he talked of little else. I was particularly impressed with your letter, printed therein, which I may have seen before, but if so have forgotten it. Coming from you it is a very strong recommendation.

I learned from Gen. Howard that you have been very generous to them in the matter of helping to provide funds for expenses in the past. This shows that you approve of the school, and its methods and aims.

So far as I can remember Doctor, I have never made any suggestions to you in regard to benevolence, and what I write now is only a suggestion. When you have given a matter of this kind due thought, I would have more confidence in your judgment than in my own, as you have made the whole subject a matter of special study for many years.

In talking with the General to-day I was impressed with two or three things about which I venture to write you, taking it for granted that you are contemplating helping to procure an endowment for this school at some future time. If I am mistaken in this, you will, of course, pay no attention to my suggestion.

First, Gen. Howard is growing old- now nearly seventy- and his wounds do not add to his prospects of longevity. His comrades of equal rank have all been 'mustered out'.

Second, he can do more in procuring the money- if you or any one were to start a conditional endowment- in six months, than any one else could in two years. He has for several years been laboring in this work; knows it thoroughly, and has a goodly sum of smaller conditional gifts in sight. He personally knows many prominent and wealthy people and knows who to approach if he can get a good start.

Third, his heart and soul is in the work, and he wants to close his active life's labors in the direction of establishing schools, in making this Lincoln Memorial a success. Lincoln loved and honored these loyal mountaineers; so does Gen. Howard; so do you. Witness the enclosed letter in behalf of this school, and also your bringing Berea

into national prominence and an assured future by giving it the timely help you have . Gen. Howard was Lincoln's friend; you are Gen. Howard's friend. Why not link the three names together in the history of the future by giving your aid to Lincoln Memorial University?

I know you will take this letter in the spirit in which it is written. I would not think of writing it but that I am sure you are interested in this school, and whatever is done will be many fold more successful if done in Gen. Howard's lifetime.

These people are found suffering from all ills caused from hardships and exposure, though not complaining.



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

Dear General Howard:

In June last, I
left California, after having spent
six weeks in a W.R.C. Home, at
Evergreen, near San Jose, admitted by
a physician's certificate.

In Salt Lake City, I was in St.
Mark's Hospital, ten days, told that
an operation ^{woman's trouble} would be necessary.
It was so very severe, likely to end my
life, that I did not submit to it,
and am still suffering, to a cer-
tain extent.

I went to Bloomfield, Iowa, my
husband's old home, to try to recover
\$200.00, lent to his step-mother,
after I had already given her \$200.00
for her husband's tombstone, on N

which my husband's name was also cut.

It was a foolish loan, made in ignorance of circumstance. I found Mrs. Mullock to be irresponsible, to have sons that are drunkards, a daughter, an opium eater. It was impossible to get the slightest return for benefits, not even a postage stamp.

I boarded with a person who waited three months, for the pension money, but who was not willing to do so, again. Hoping finally, to get to New York, I came to Chicago.

When the money was gone, the Capt. of the G.W.C.A. asked me to leave, they demands board in advance, and for one weeks' board - \$6.00, left my trunk.

I went to the Home of the Friendless,

and, I laid theree weeks, was taken very ill, with a severe cold, went to St. Luke's Hospital, with a temperature of 104°, and was told that consumption had begun. They could not keep me, without money. I went to the County Hospital, was kept three fine days, and sent here. It is a dreadful place, I have had vermin, been starved, been obliged to wear the same underclothing for three weeks, as I have no money to get back things left at a laundry, and no strength. The left lung is slightly affected, has pain, but the doctor says, can be cured. My pension voucher was a day late in going to San Francisco, the check has not yet returned.

When it does, I shall rent a room, in Chicago, and do my own cooking, but
