

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

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schools of academy and college grade established in its territory west of Hastings and south of the Platte river. It is today stronger and better equipped than in any year of its history. 185 students were enrolled during the year 1899, 113 during 1st semester of the current year. We have three buildings which with equipments, lands, &c. are worth \$26,000. In the erection of Ladies' Hall in 1886 a mortgage indebtedness of \$2000 was incurred. In doubling the size of the Academy building in 1891 an additional \$1000 was secured by mortgage. During the last five years current indebtedness to the amount of \$2100 has accumulated. We shall need \$2400 in contributions to meet the current expenses of the present year—a total of \$7500 to pay mortgage and all debts and bills to July 1, 1900. An effort is being made to meet this by means of 150 shares of \$50 each. WILL YOU TAKE A SHARE?

Reasons for helping Franklin Academy:

1. It is a Christian school and an evangelistic center. All but 5 of its 107 full course graduates were professing Christians. Seldom if ever have less than 90 per cent of our students been professing Christians at the end of the winter term.
2. It is a permanent institution. See above.
3. It is an ACADEMY, not a College. "There ought to be more and better academies, and fewer and better colleges."
4. Many prayers and gifts have centered upon Franklin Academy. You can help to conserve what has been done.
