The Civic Federation of Chicago has promoted four national After the last conference, which was conferences (see enclosure). held in September, 1899, the Chicago organization unanimously decided that the national work could be more effectively carried on through a national organization. A constitution for such an organization was adopted which states the object to be:

"To provide for a thorough discussion of questions of national import affecting either the foreign or domestic policy of the United States, to aid in the crystallization of the most enlightened public sentiment of the country in respect thereto and, when desirable, to promote necessary legislation in accordance therewith."

The plan provides for the appointment of an Advisory Council of five hundred. Several months have been spent in carefully selecting the members of this council the object of the committee being to secure only representative, conservative, practical men of affairs, Republicans and Democrats. No federal or state officeholders, professional politicians, cranks, hobbyists or revolutionists have been knowingly included. The Committee on Organization begs to announce the appointment of the citizens whose names appear on the enclosed list to constitute said Advisory Council and hopes that you will not object to the use of your name in connection therewith.

An executive committee of twenty-five will be formed to act until the first annual meeting which will occur sometime between the 15th of August and the 10th of September, the place and date yet to be fixed. No member of the Advisory Council assumes any responsibility for sentiments uttered at the conferences that he does not endorse.

President Frost of Berea College was in to see me yesterday and I will tell you the entire conversation when we meet.


I hope this letter will find you at Cumberland Gap and in good health and strength. I should be very glad to hear from you and how Mr. Larry is getting on with his work.

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



My Dear General: We were very much relieved to find that you got through, though we were sorry to learn of your hard time in doing it. All day long we wondered whether the storm had gone your way: but we hoped that it had spared you.
