





Friday, May 25, 1900

My dear Sir:

I have your letter in answer to mine, stating that you would give us an address on "Grant and his Generals." That is perfectly satisfactory.

I think you need not take so early a train as that which leaves New York at six o'clock A. M., as you will see by the enclosed time-table. As we prefer to have the address begin at eleven o'clock, and in order to persit your own convenience, you could leave New York at 8.25, if you leave from the Twenty-third Street Station, or at 8.30 from either of the other two, and reach Trenton at 10.13. Unless advised to the contrary, I shall take the liberty of meeting you at Trenton at 10.13, with a carriage, and drive you out to Lawrenceville. It will take us forty-five minutes, or a little less.

At the sametime, it will give you no chance to rest between the time of your arrival and the beginning of the exercises. 
