




Selling this to the city may call attention to the tract in a way which will help our remaining holdings but of this we cannot be certain.

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



Gen O. O. Howard. Dear Bro. You will remember
 that two years ago I engaged you for "Patriotic
 Day" at our Clear Lake Assembly. I need not
 tell you how much I did to advertise you so
 that the G. A. R. boys of Iowa might rally to
 see and hear you - nearly the last one of the
 honored Union Generals. Major Bond did not
 positively notify me (that you could not, on
 account of quarantining, get to us in time to
 meet your engagement) until within a week of
 the date. The result was that I could not find
 a distinguished military officer to take your
 place. Toarge delegations of the G. A. R.,
 which had arranged to come, did not do
 so when they heard that you would not
 get there. I think we lost about \$75 by
 the disappointment. Last year I had seen
 John C. Black on "Patriotic Day". This year
 I would like to have you Aug 10 and your
 agent Mr Wagner, of Chicago, makes me
 the same special rate of \$75 and transportation
 from Chicago to Clear Lake and return, but dear

General, we have already engaged so many attractions that we will likely come out in debt. Clear Lake is a small town and we can charge only \$1.50 for a season ticket of 2 weeks of attractions. The Epworth League young people in charge of the assembly barely pay expenses but they want to do good. It is not a money-making institution but an organization of young people to honor Christ and His work. I have had charge five years and practically give them my time and services free. I can omit "Patriotic Day" and save the expense. I dislike to ask you if you would come for \$50 and expenses from Chicago to Clear Lake and return but I may have to pay even that amount from my pocket. Will you allow me to try to get you some other engagement in Iowa or Nebraska at \$75 and all expenses if you come to me for \$50? This is a personal matter and I suggest that you do not confer with your agent unless you are under obligations to do so.




