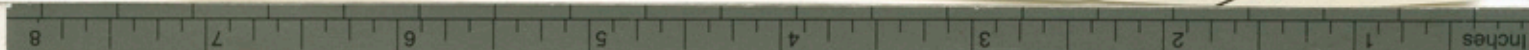

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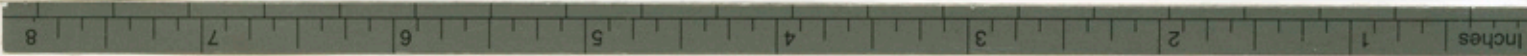

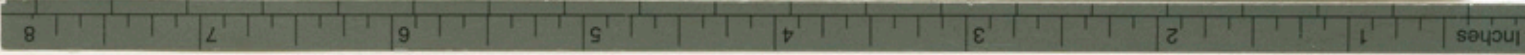

My Dear General :-

I want to thank you for your kind acceptance of my invitation to be at Plymouth church tomorrow evening. And I have thought that it might help you in determining the trend of your talk if I told you a little of our situation.

Mr. Chamberlain is also going on this transport, and has promised to act as sort of body-guard in case I can procure permission to travel.
