

Your kind note at hand and carefully read. There are two ways in which you can expend the thirty-five dollars to good advantage for the soldiers. First, buy the books outright and send them to us and let us forward them to the Philippines intact. Second, buy the books yourself and send them up here and let us open the packages and put one or more books in our traveling libraries which would be much preferable. Now, let me explain my meaning. If you should invest thirty-five dollars in good books in the American Tract Society send them to us. We have over seventy traveling libraries something like the catalogue of one of which I enclose; this is library 29. These books go to Cuba, Puerto Rico and the Philippines and are doing untold good. I think we have over fifty traveling libraries in the Philippines alone which are put in one camp for a few weeks and then transferred to another and to another, and so on. If you would send to us the books you wished we would send them to be placed in these traveling libraries and they would reach more soldiers in this way than if they would go as a whole as one library. We shall be very glad to help you in any way in this matter.

Thank you for your courtesy in sending me tickets for the Lincoln Birthday celebration which I very much regret I cannot use personally but am using by proxy. The reason why I cannot use them is because I have accepted an invitation to attend a gathering at Mr. Rockefeller's on that night.
