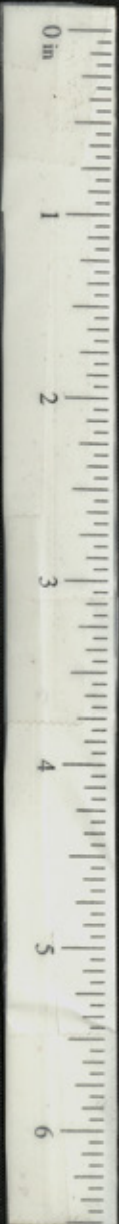
Dear Sir;-

That meeting, those speeches, the singing by the chorus, and the whole business was one of the grandest, if not the grandest thing that I ever had the privilege of attending.

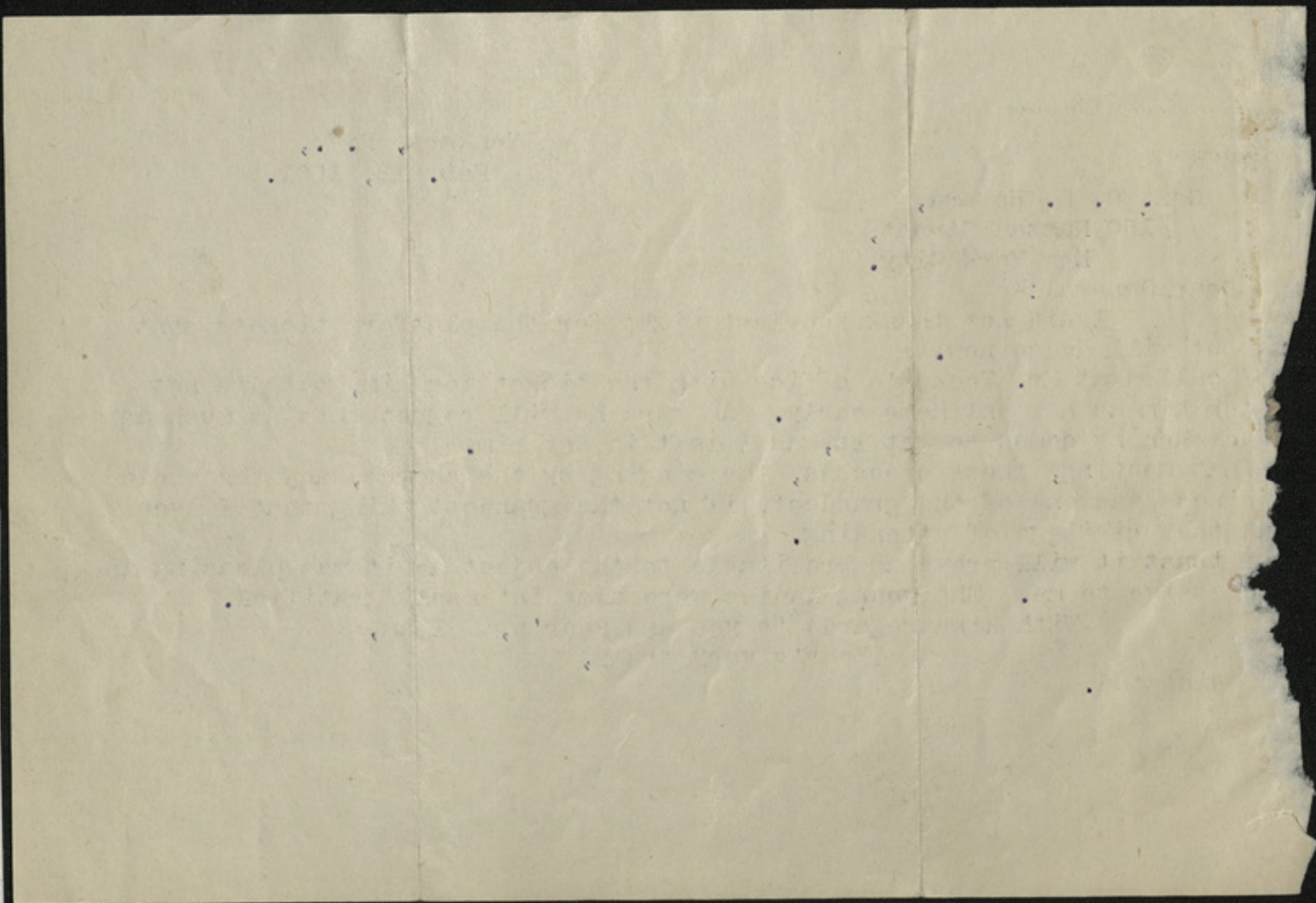
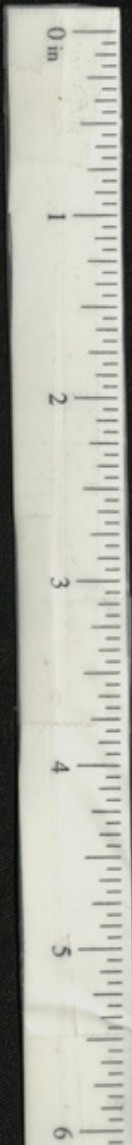
