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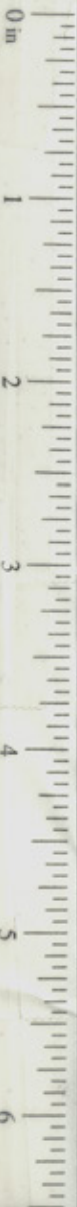

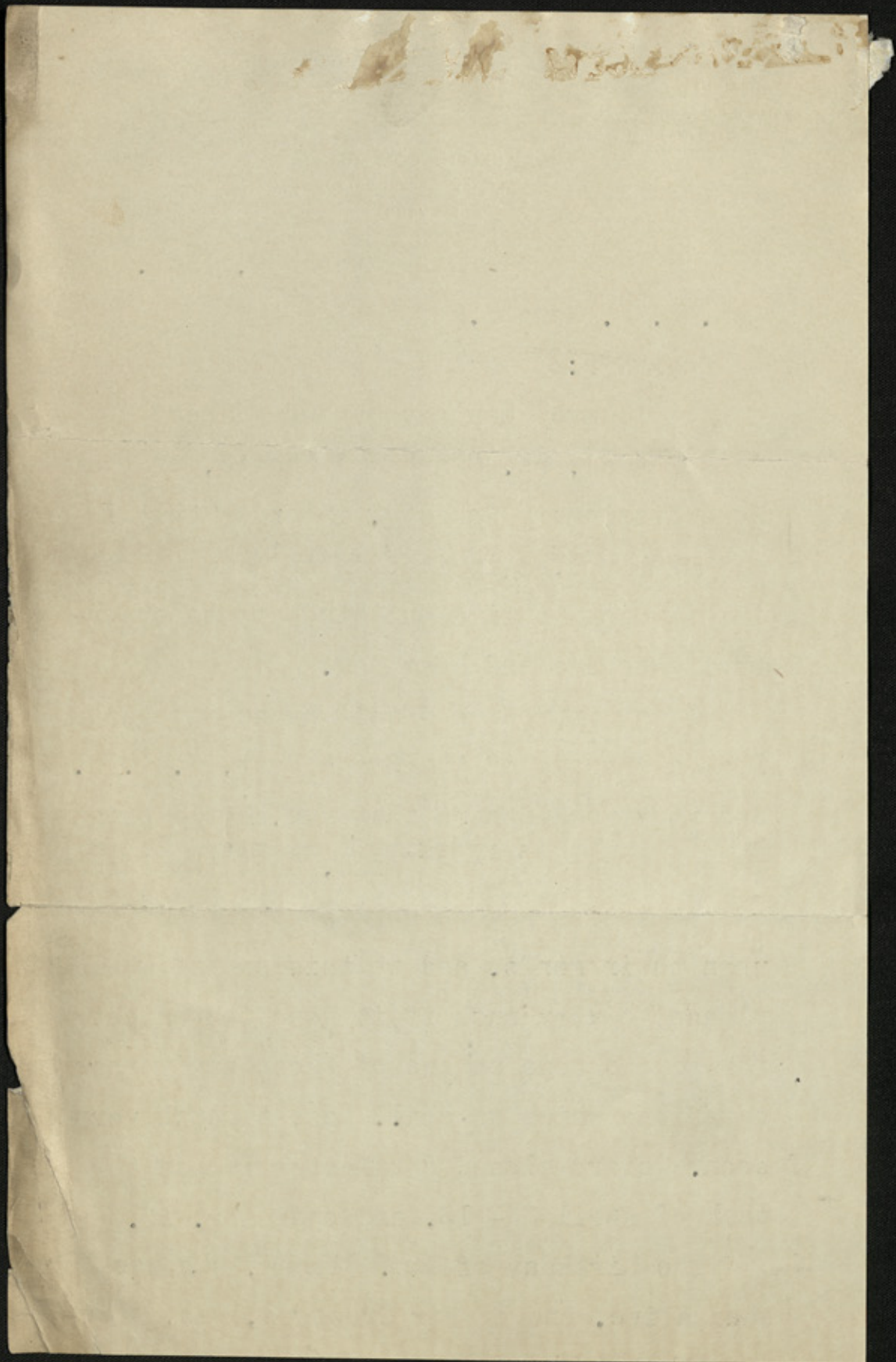
Gen. O. O. Howard,

dress at that service.

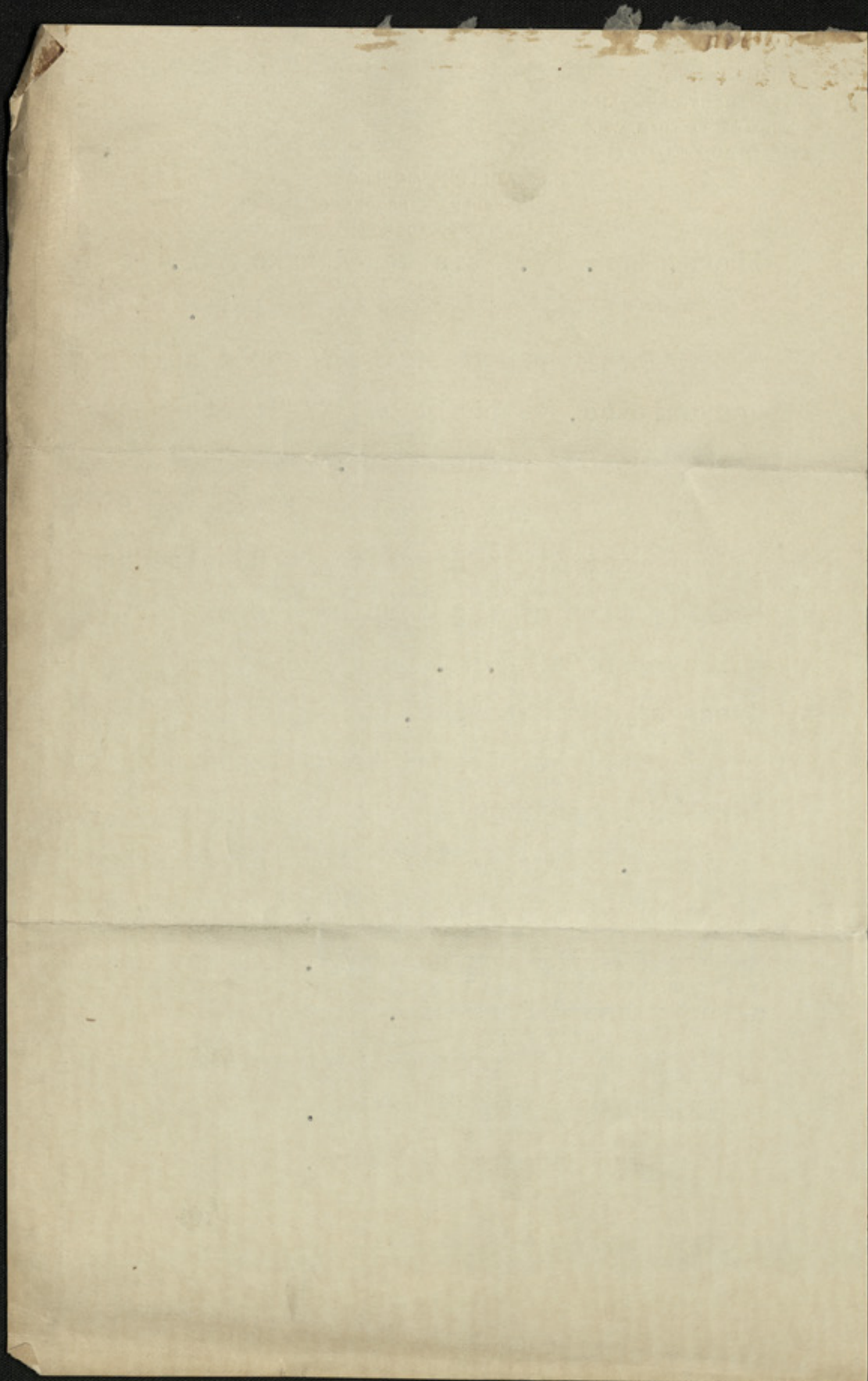
I shall be pleased to call and see you

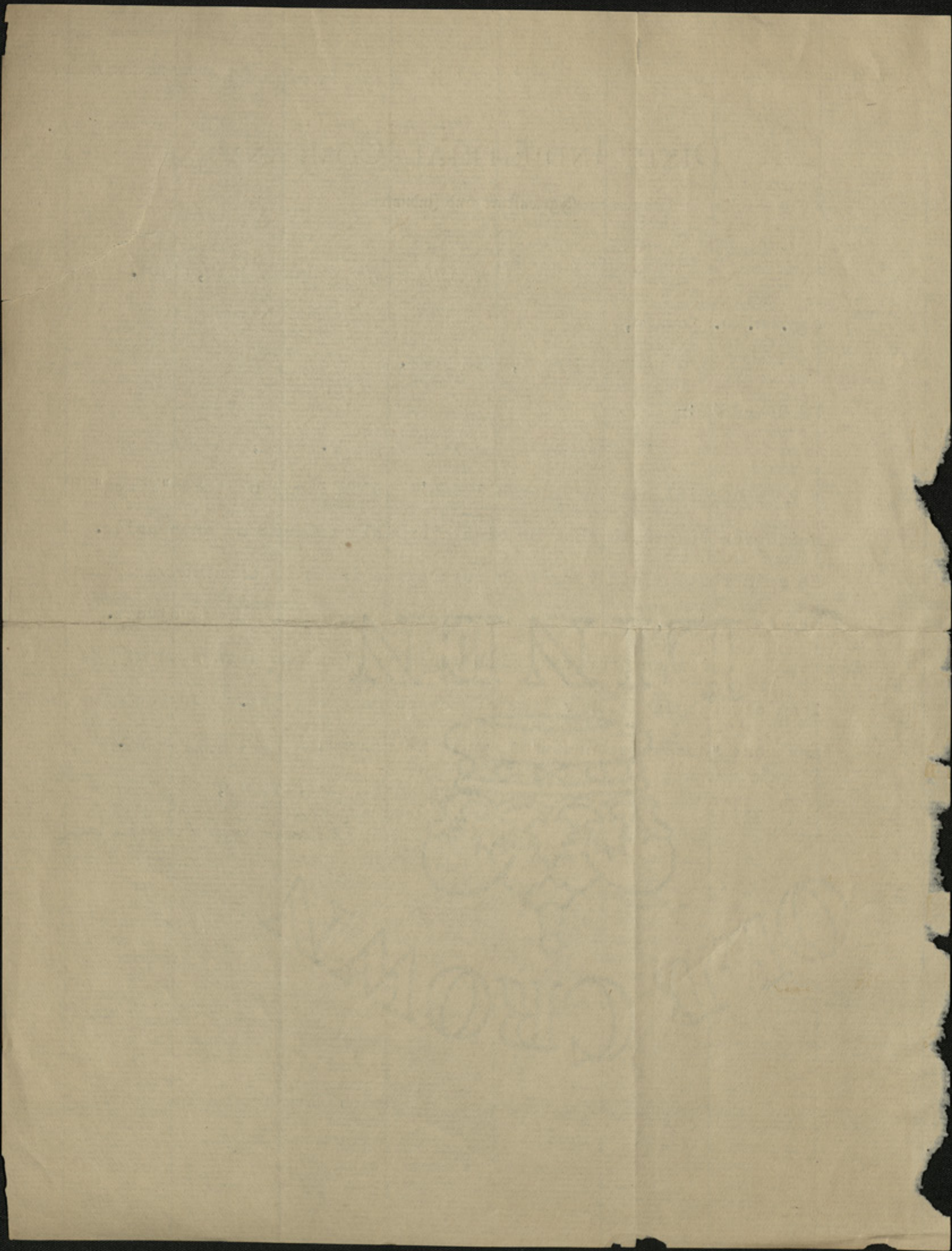
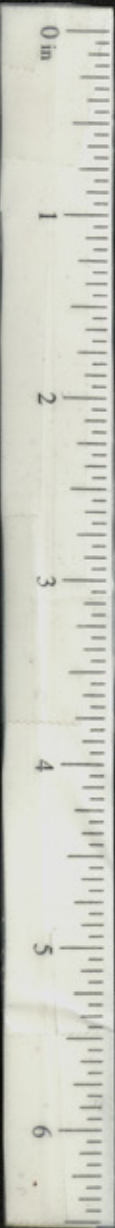
My Dear Sir:-

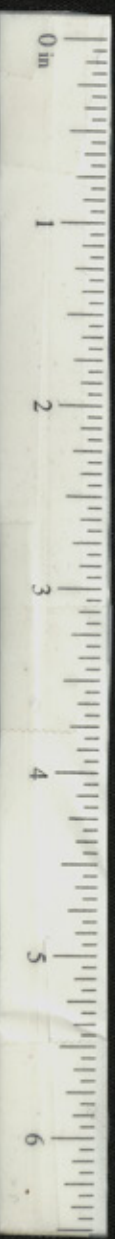

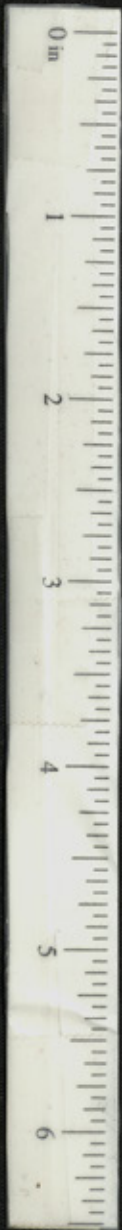
I expect to be in New York soon and will call and see you.
