



My dear General:

I would be very glad if you could kindly tell me something of the duties and assignment of Inspectors General and Acting Inspectors General, who served under you while in command of troops during the Civil War, - the general instructions under which they operated and the scope and character of their work. The Army Regulations of 1861-3, in addition to prescribing a form

of inspection for troops, states among other things that The hospital being at all times an object of particular interest, it will be critically and minutely inspected.


The Inspector, attended by the company officers, will examine the general arrangement of the interior of the quarters, the bunks, bedding, cooking and table utensils, and such other objects as may present themselves; and afterward the exterior.

The Adjutant will exhibit to the Inspector the regimental books and papers, including those relating to the transactions of the Council of Administration. The company books and papers will also be exhibited, the whole together, generally at the Adjutant's office, in the presence of the officers not otherwise particularly engaged.

The Inspector will examine critically the books and accounts of the administrative and disbursing officers of the command, and the money and property in their keeping.

The present Congress has authorized 22 Generals and only 17 Inspectors General, as if it were expected some of the Generals may not individually exercise commands or need inspectors. Or was it the custom that some or most of the Brigade, Division, Corps or Army Commanders did not have officers assigned or detailed to inspection duty during our civil war anywhere, though it was usual in other armies to have them? 
My dear Gen. Howard,


