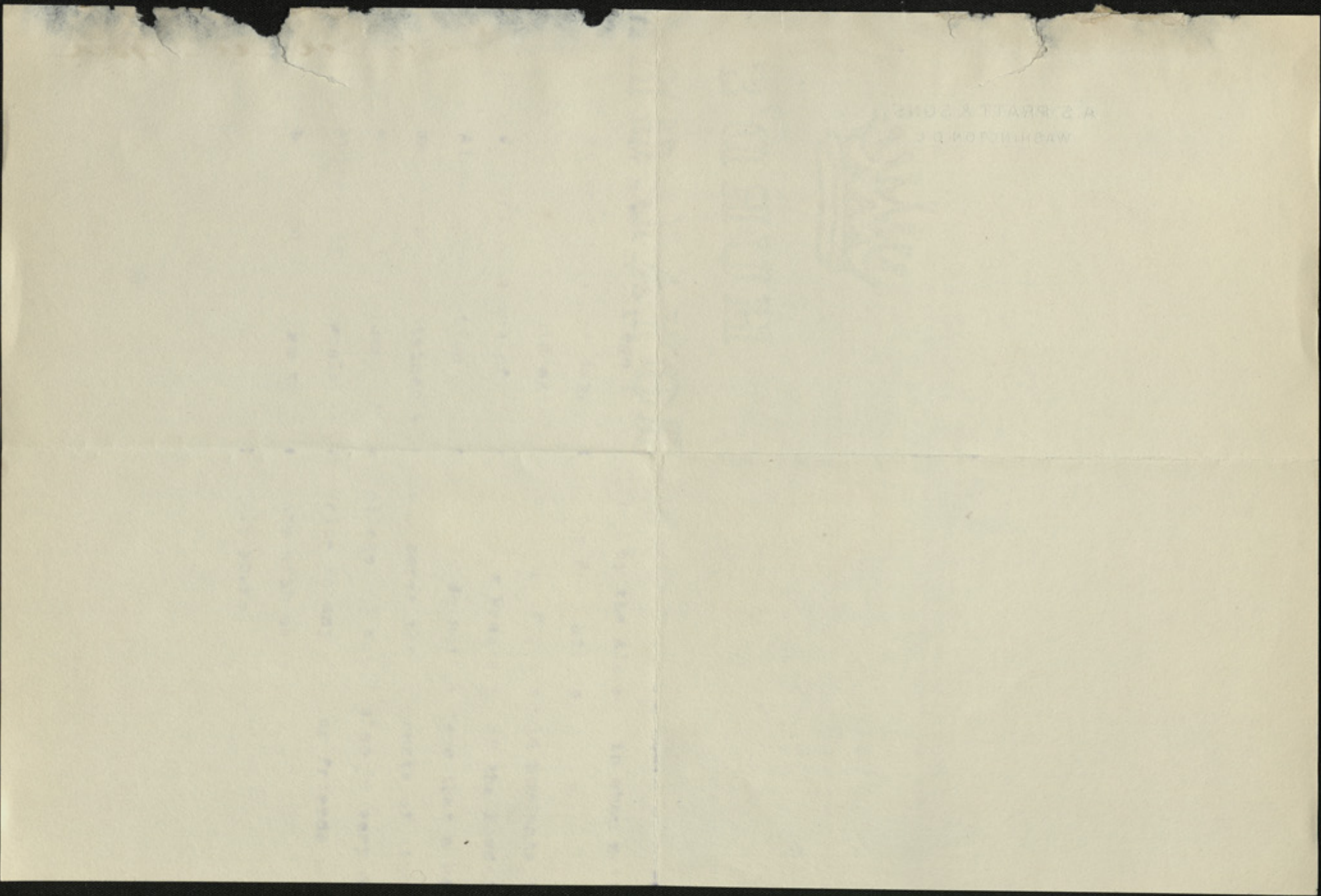
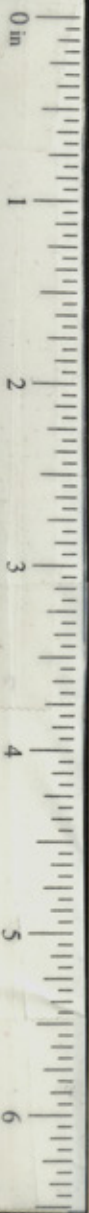
Recalling your inquiry

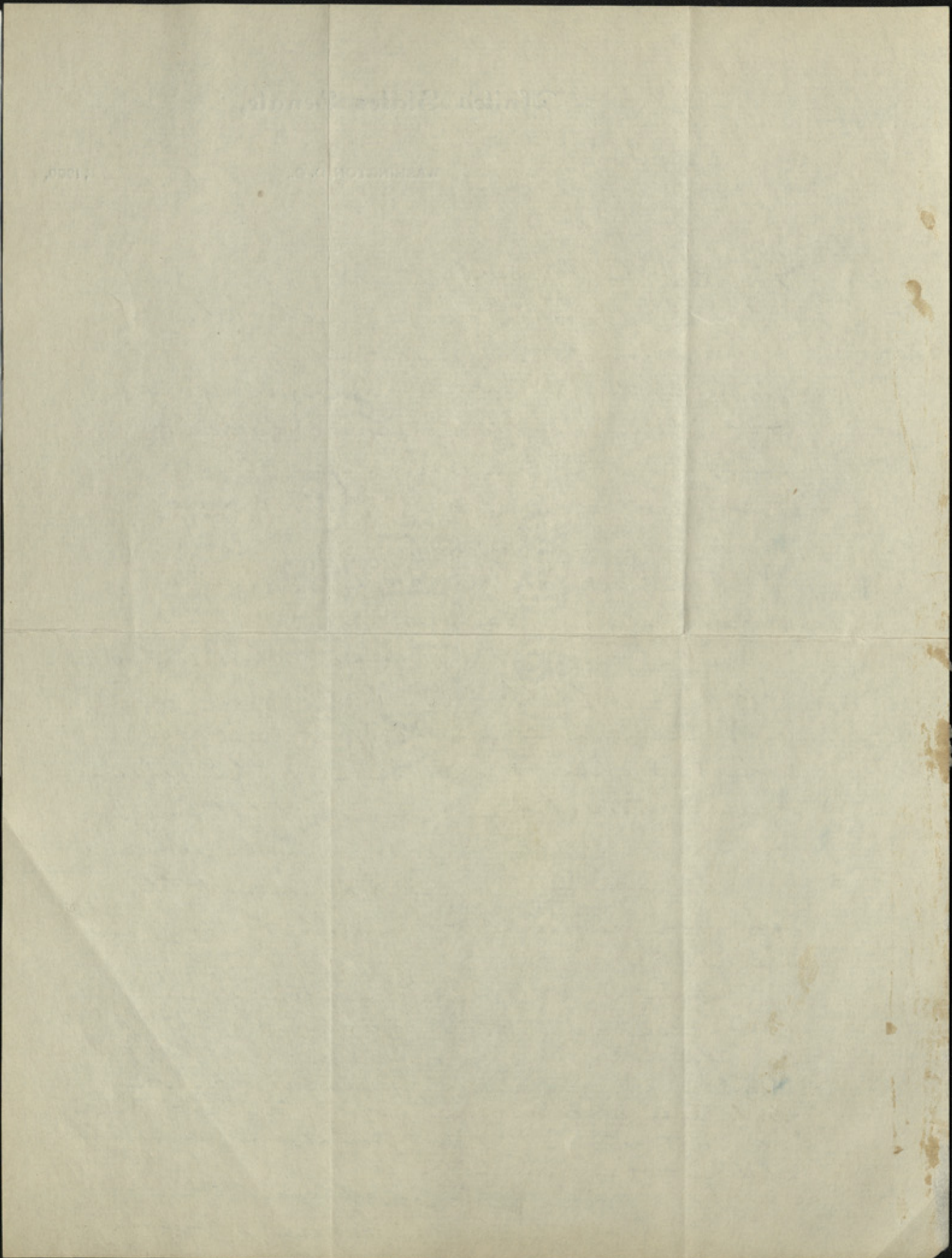
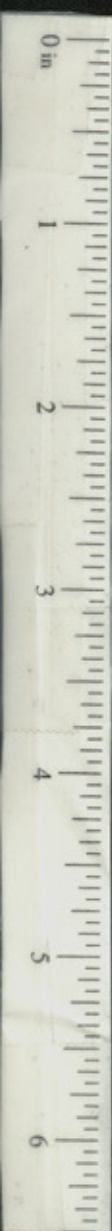
My dear Genl Howard:-

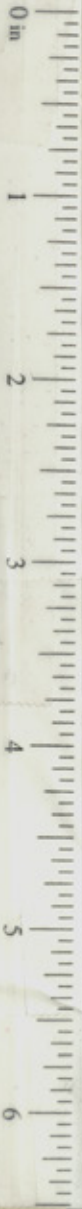
