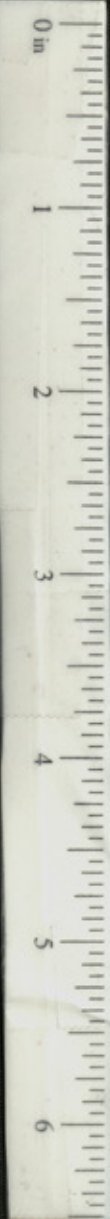
My dear General Howard:--

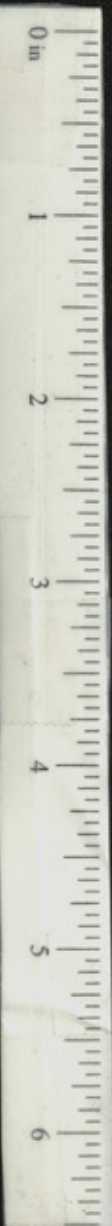

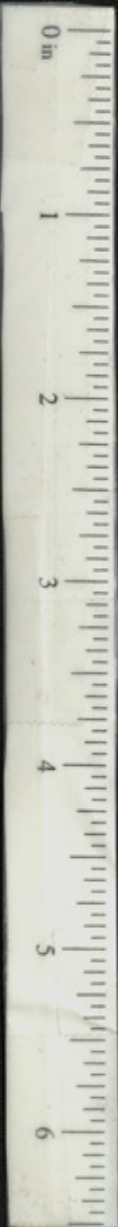

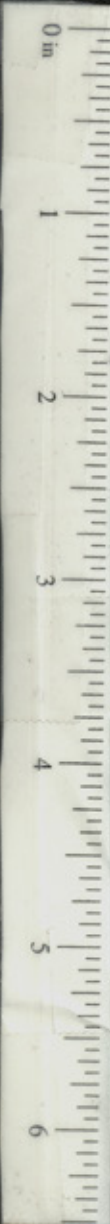
I would do this, simply to show you that I have several friends, and that "almost all our citizens" have not signed the petition; and without any reference to the action of the board at the annual meeting.

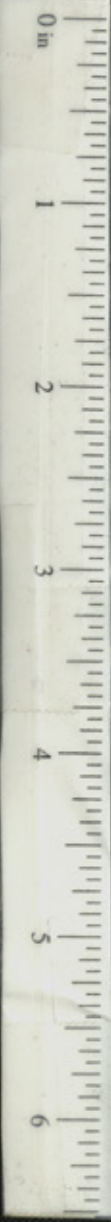
