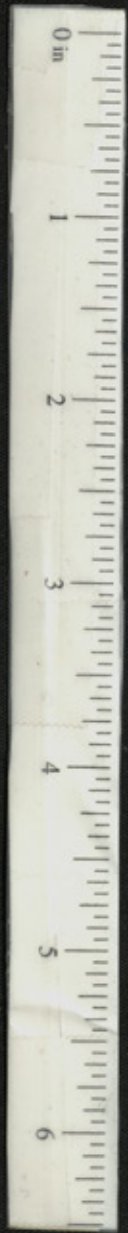

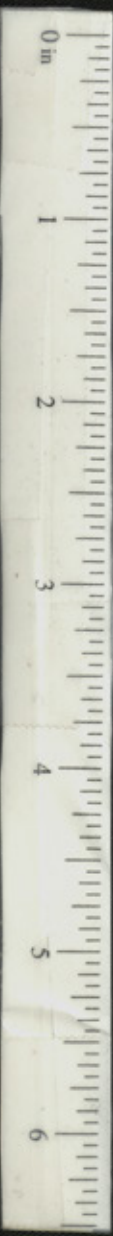
Dear General:-

You are right in what you say of my condition when I left New York. I have, however, experienced great benefit from the baths and out-door life of this place. 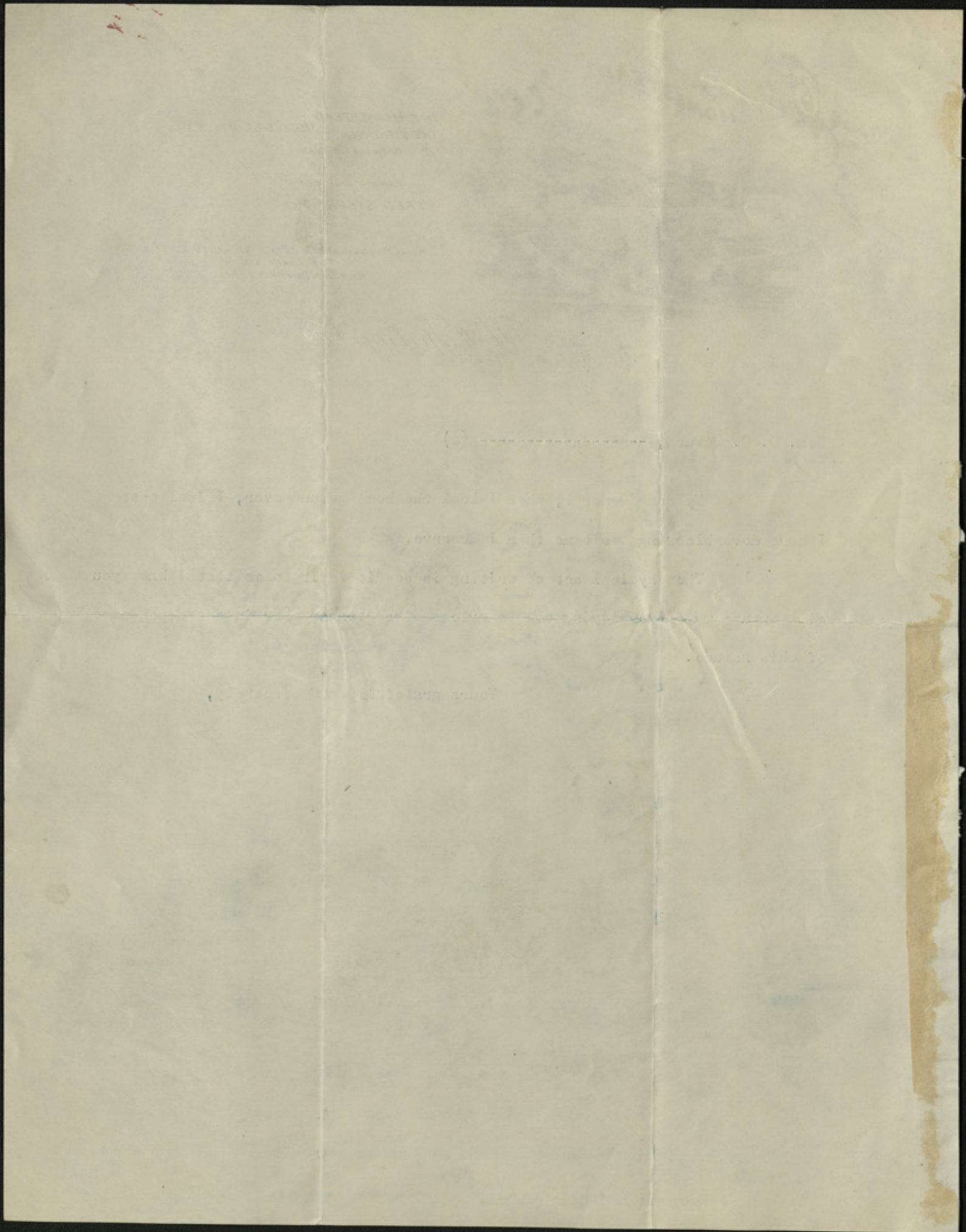

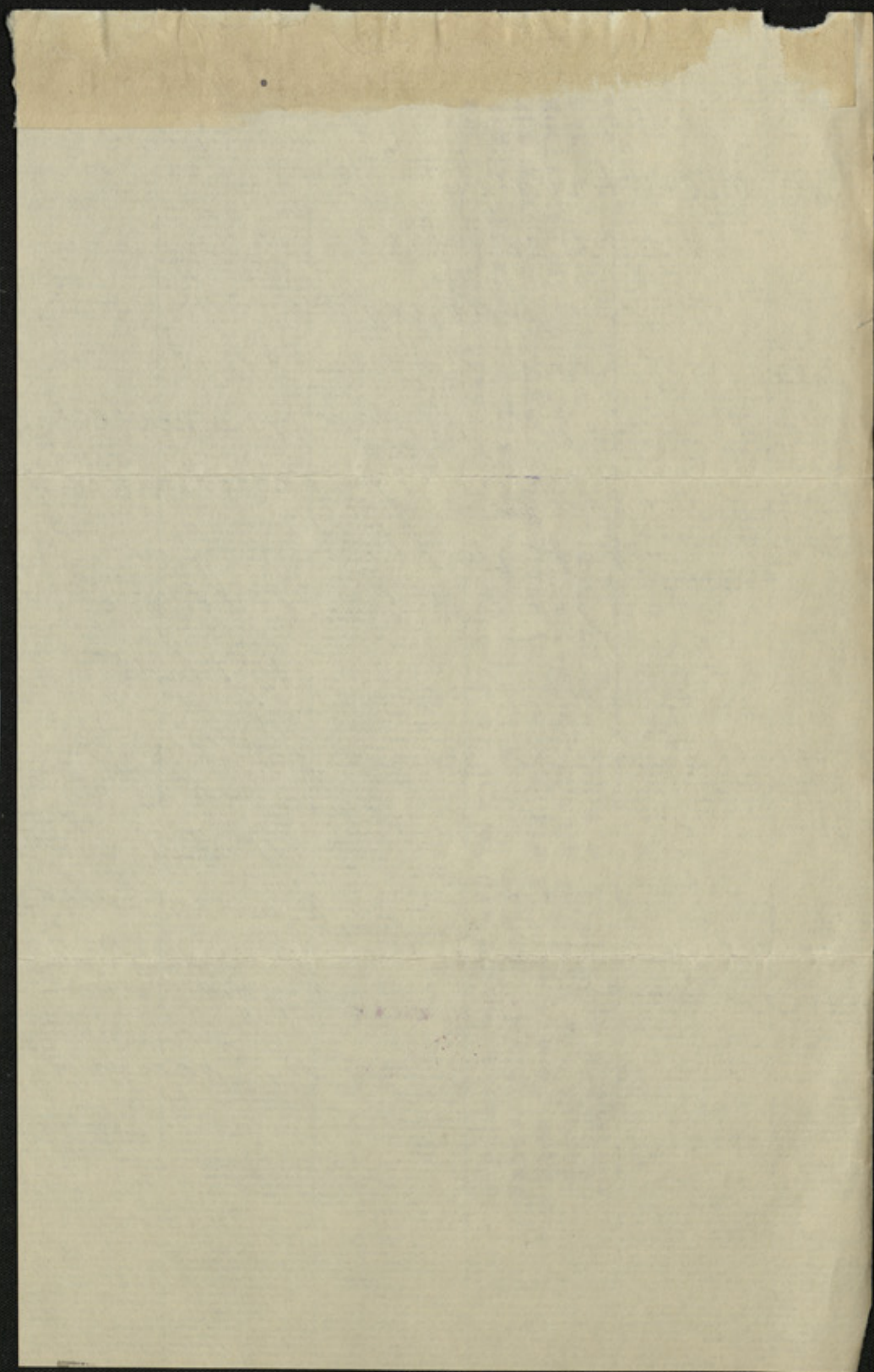

I had supposed that the building had been built some time ago, as I remember seeing cuts of what purported to be such a building, but evidently it was not built.

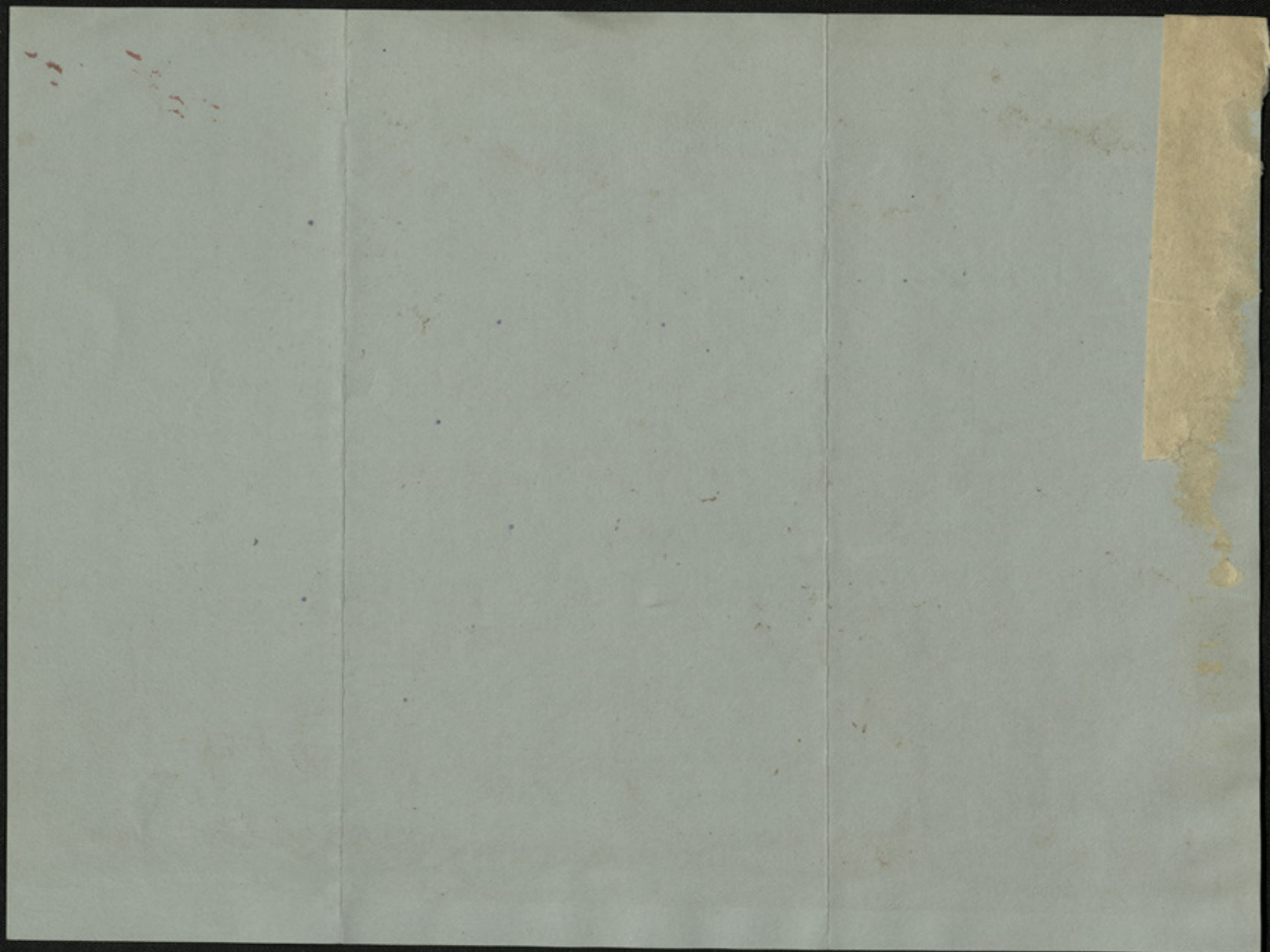

We are now having fine weather, and work on the farm is being pushed as rapidly as possible.

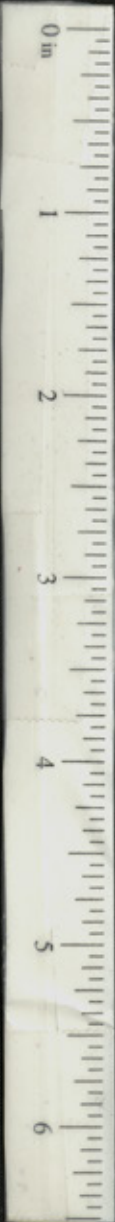
