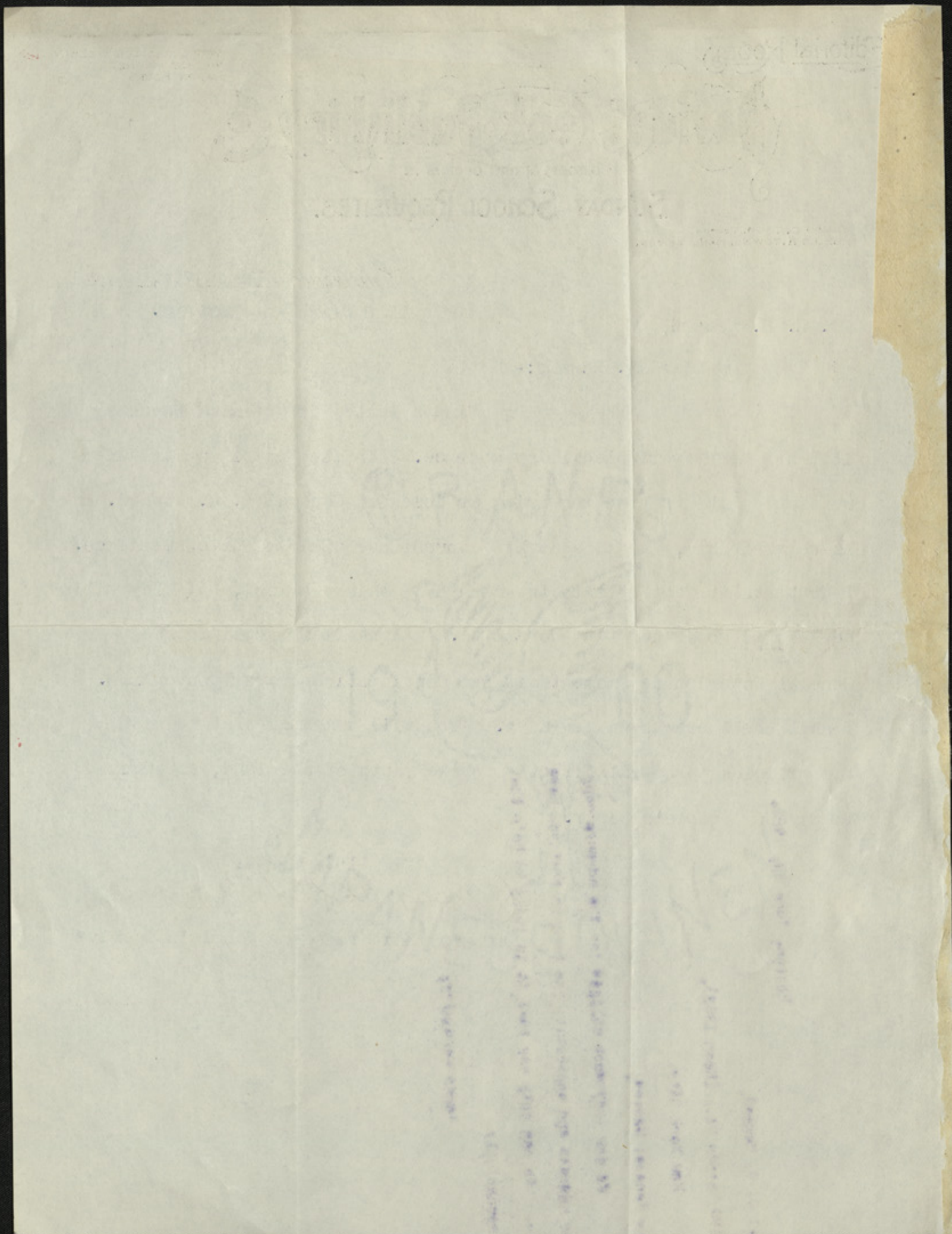
My Dear Mr. Howard:-

Dear Sir:

I have your letter of 15th inst.
I return the letter of Mr. S. P. Avery, as requested.
I note what you say about planning well,
during latter &c, intimating that you propose
to use this amount of money from the
building fund (Avery's gift) with a distinct
understanding that it shall be paid back
to that fund by, by the University.

As I received Mr. Avery's instructions to me,
as Treasurer of the fund, I would not con-
sider that I have any business to loan
the money to the University for such
purpose. I am to pay out the money
for the new building upon your order,
but I should require that your order

for so much of the money as would be
required for the purchase of machinery
&c. should have written as to
it, Mr. Barry's consent. I would
not honor it otherwise.

The money is deposited with
Franklin Trust Co. & is drawing in-
terest at rate of 3%. I would not
think of buying securities & selling
a part, as the money is needed from
time to time, - that would make
a burden of the Treasurer's office.

I wrote Mr. A. that I should
so deposit it. I have so little
confidence in Mr. Barry's way of
doing things that I am sorry that
he is to direct in the construction
of any building.
