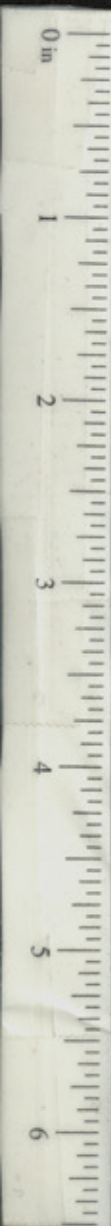
Dear Sir:

By some of the records, of Maryville College, at Maryville, Blount County, Tenn., I see that you contributed a considerable sum to the endowment fund of that institution. It also appears that you made this contribution, upon the express condition, that there should be no discrimination against colored students. The Legislature of Tenn., recently passed an Act prohibiting the co-education of whites and blacks, in the same institution.

The directors of the College pretend that have set apart \$ 16,000, rather, the interest on \$16,000, for the education of such colored students, as choose to go to a third or fourth rate colored school, ^{near} ~~near~~ Rogersville, Hawkins County Tenn., and maintain that this action on thier part is a full discharge of their duties to the colored race under the charter and donations made by you and others.

The colored people, ^{and Knoxville have} ~~of Maryville, Tenn.~~ resolved to assert and maintain their rights in said College, and endowment fund, in the Courts, so far as it is practicable, for them to do so. To this end they have employed me to bring the proper action and to take proper steps in their behalf.
