
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Gen'l. O. O. Howard, Burlington, Vt. My dear General----




"The work you propose would be interesting and the college would be glad to have such a volume prepared. Thomas Hyde's book is a good example of the material it might be expected to contain.


"You can of course afford to disregard this aspect of the matter; and I hope you will. But I ought to tell you of it, and then wish you all success.

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My Dear Gen. Howard :-


I have yours of 7th. After thinking the matter over very carefully I really believe that it will be best to postpone our interview until after your return from the Pacific Coast. By that time I will have the manuscript all in good shape, with notes, suggestions, etc., to be submitted to you, and then we can go over the whole thing together either here or in Burlington, or New York, or anywhere that may be most convenient for you. I think I shall have to postpone the publication of the book for a few months, because a book that I have had in hand for a good while and which ought to have appeared at least six months ago, is still in the works, but I shall bring it out this fall. The attention it would demand would deprive your book of the special attention I want to give to it, for I want to make a good success of it. I think it is rather providential, therefore, that we are prevented from coming together just now, for I honestly think the book will be all the better for giving deliberate attention to it. Besides, it will look quite different to you a couple of months hence -such things always do after they have been pigeon-holed -- and you will see things in the manuscript that you could not probably see now. That is my experience, and I believe the universal experience of any one who does literary work.





Also kindly forward a photo of yourself to be used in connection with the same.


