
Dear General;--



The other day I received a letter from Mrs. Clark, and I want to share a portion of it with you, and then make a request. Mrs. Clark wrote me as follows:




of schools" - I see by the book
that by an order of Apr. 15th
1867 he was appointed Agent-in-
charge - over what was then called

a "District" - with 10 counties; here is no mention of the School Superintendency, nor in his letters do I find any (tho' he speaks of his school inspections often as part of his routine).

I also find by his letters that he began work at Hampton, as he says as Beaufort Superintendent over 10 counties, March, 1866, a year earlier than your book gives - his description of his work at first seems to point to his being asst.

Supt. of Schools, but he writes officially from office "Beaufort Superintendent".
