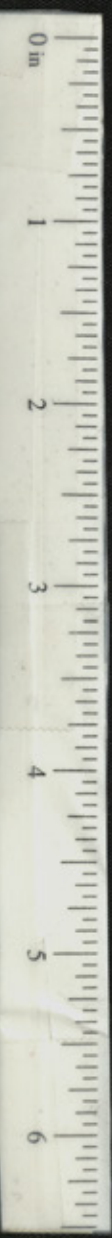
My dear General:-
