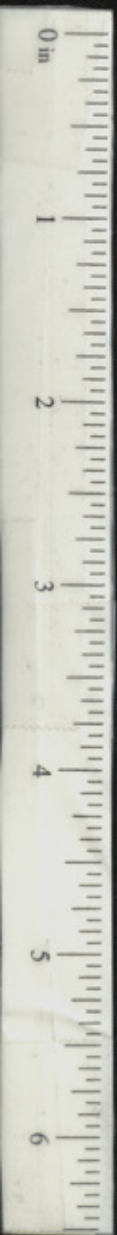
Your kind letter came today just as we started on our first trip among the ships in the Mission Launch. It was foggy, rainy, and cold on the water but 34 big vessels and scores of little ones were at anchor in the Roads, and, warmed and cheered by such hearty good wishes, we started in Jesus' Name. We boarded 12 vessels and distributed God's word and good reading matter on them, and went alongside 23 more <sup>135</sup> throwing packages of religious papers, etc aboard. So the work is started. As yet we have had no outside help. Funds remaining

from my pay as Chaplain has paid all my expenses to date and I have enough on hand to pay everything to March 1<sup>st</sup>. We make no debts. Praise God for providing so amply.

The Launch is given us for the month by a poor child of God as his gift to the Mission. He himself is my valued helper at a merely nominal wage.

The Newport News people are ready for the Home. I want you and Admiral Watson at the Mass Meeting which will open the Campaign. You say you are free from the 16<sup>th</sup> to the 22<sup>nd</sup> Feb. Can you come for the 18<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> leaving on the 21<sup>st</sup>? Please do so for the Master's sake in getting this new work for Him started, if you can. I am with you heart and soul in your opposition to the iniquitous selfish Dutchman's laws. 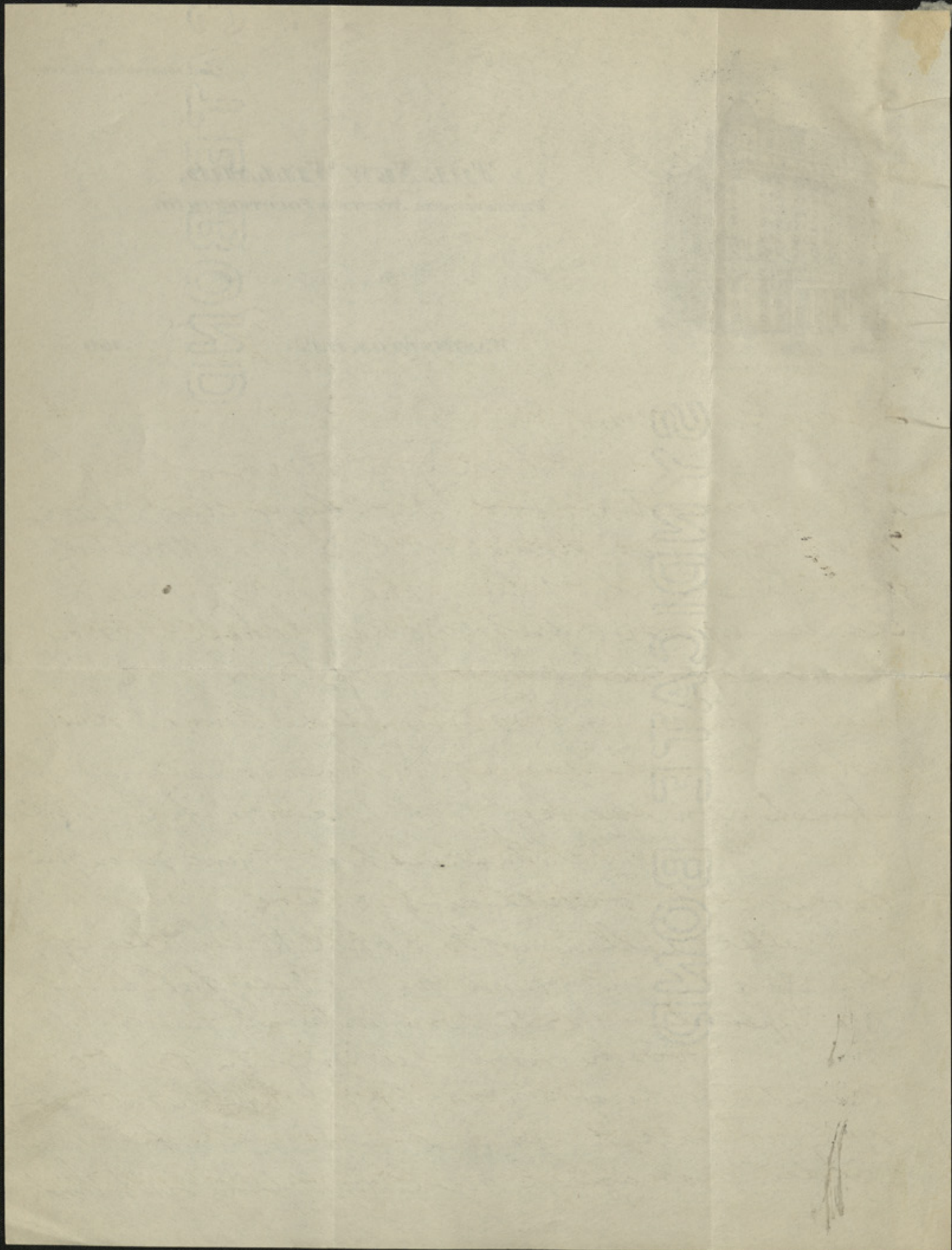
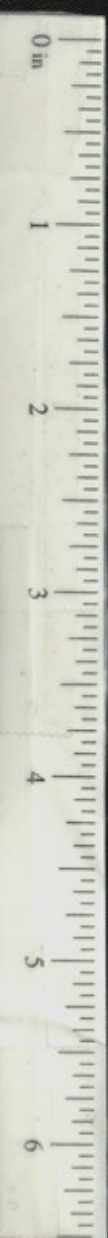

Dear Gen. Howard:

Thank you for your favor of 29<sup>th</sup> ult. You got a good scolding did you when you got home. Well, if Mrs. Howard and Bessie don't "turn me down" (true a classical expression) I don't know as I shall worry myself as to what some of the rest of the family may do. 'La, 'la. But going aside, Gen., I did not get the invitation to go to the Congregational church you speak of. Had I received it I should certainly have been at the church or have given you the reason why I could not be there.

I called one afternoon at the E. Pitt House to see if you were in and found you very busy dictating to a typewriter—you were very intensely busy. I waited in the same room you were in for 50 minutes thinking you might get through such far work but you did not and I was obliged to leave. I did not speak to you for I did not think

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it might disturb you, engaged just as you were.  
next day you was before a Senate Committee and  
I went to Dickinson on business.

Of course I would have been very, very glad to  
have <sup>had</sup> at least a few moments visit with you but

I must say I don't favor immigration  
of Chinamen: did they come here hoping and  
honestly desiring to become American Citizens, like  
the Prussians, Irish, Germans (I wish something would  
prevent Prince Henry coming here) Scotch & English  
I would feel differently: we might Christianize  
and Americanize them and in time make good  
citizens of them but that is just what they have never  
shown any disposition or desire to do (my rare exceptions  
of course).

I am disgusted with Schley, but  
not so much with him as with the people who, in  
their ignorance or for political purposes, are chasing after  
him. I think Sampson the greatest naval character  
developed in the Spanish war, and England was  
the only friend we had among European nations.

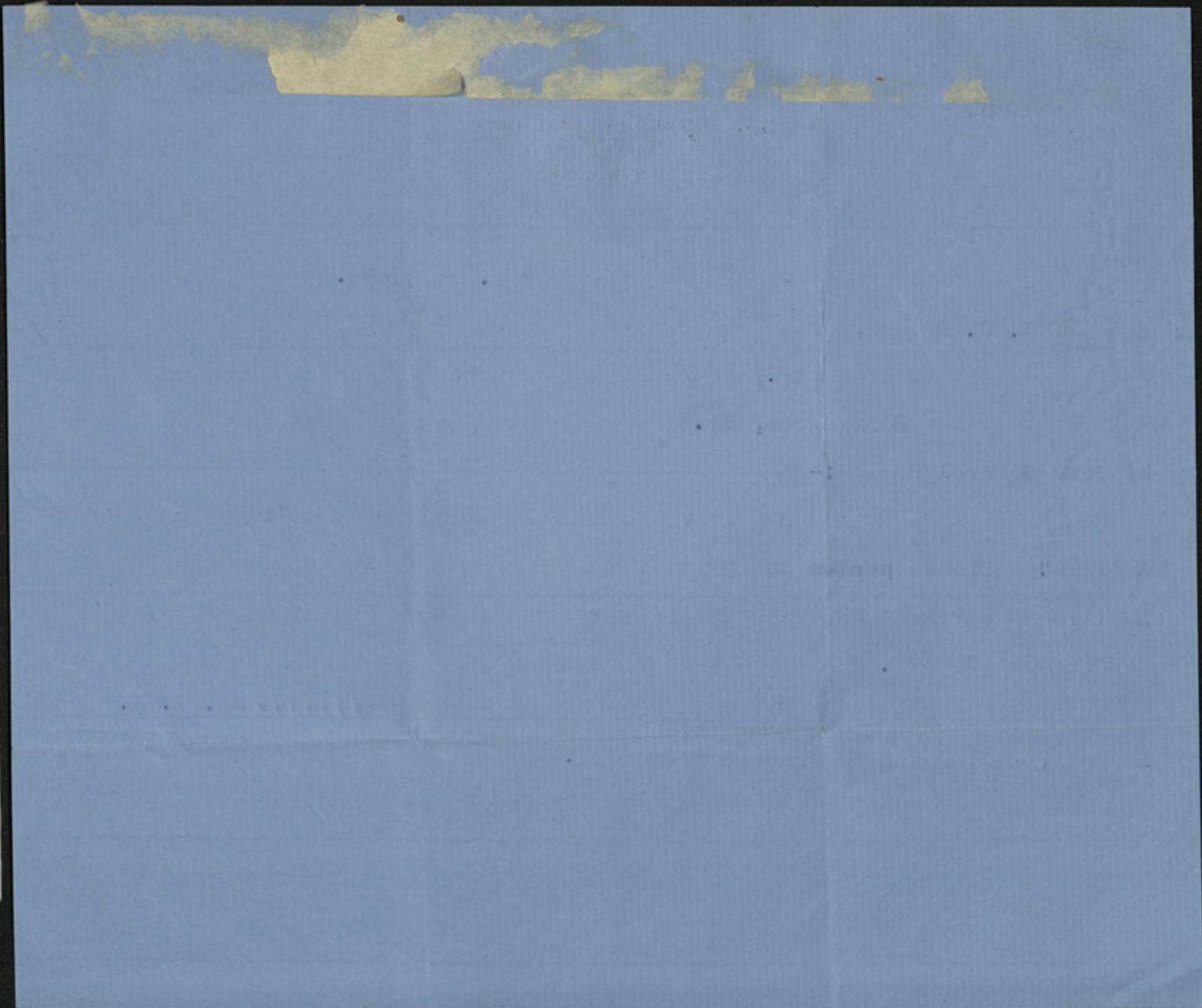
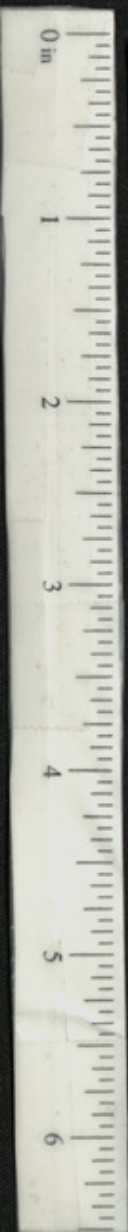

My dear Sir:

I took the liberty of sending you a copy of Senate Document # 133, which contained my report as Legislative Superintendent of our National League, to which was appended my statement before the Senate Military Committee in support of the Anti-Canteen amendment adopted last year. I trust you may be able to glance over the latter and that it may be of interest to you.

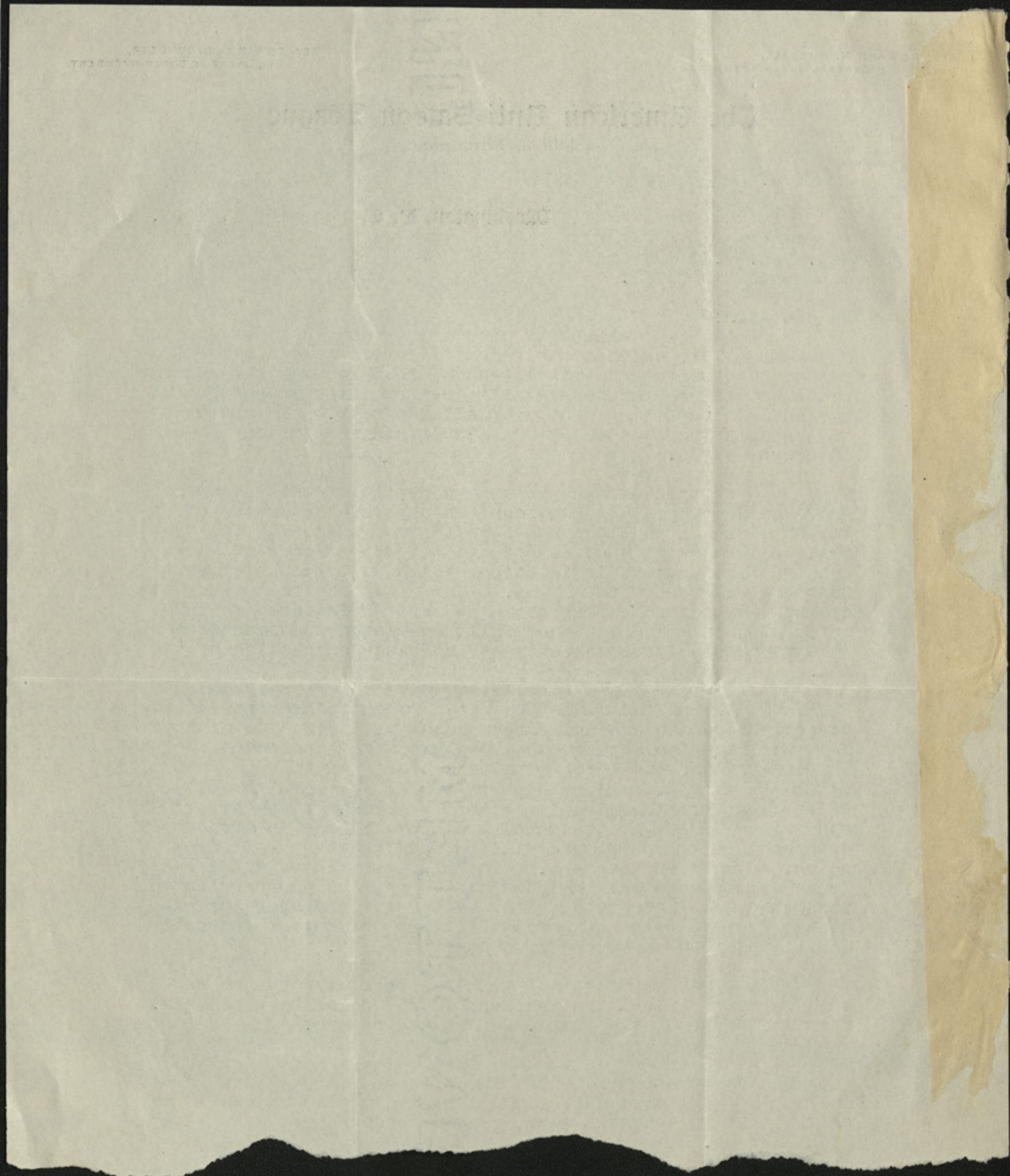
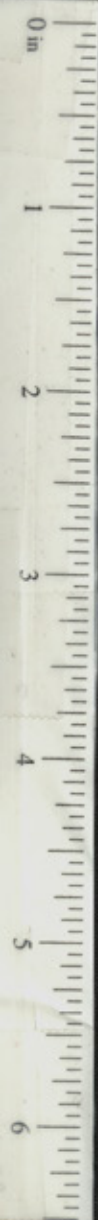
I intended also to send a copy of Senate Document #210, 2d Session, 56th Congress, which contains matter of interest along these lines and I write now especially to say that we are giving special attention to the matter of some constructive canteen legislation, which we hope the present Congress will see fit to pass. Our desire is that the post exchange system which, without the canteen feature, we have never opposed, may be successfully developed and made to conduce to the comfort, contentment, sobriety and health of the men.

During the summer I went through the reports of the Department Commanders and Bureau heads of the War Department from the time the canteen and post exchange superceded the post trader's store, and I was very much gratified to note that clear up to the time of your retirement you had opposed the official sale of liquors to soldiers in your reports. I am trustful that you will see the value of what our friends in and out of Congress are proposing and will be willing to give it the weight of your endorsement. In brief, we want a sufficiently large and substantial building at the post or on the reservation which will accommodate the restaurant and store or exchange proper, reading-room and library, gymnasium, probably a billiard room and probably a bowling alley.

I may say that the plan has been approved by men both for and against the canteen, like General Daggett, Gen. Merriam, Capt. Brooke, Capt. Munson and others.

If, after reading the data which I have sent and this general proposition, you favor these improvements in behalf of the enlisted men, I should be very glad indeed if you will kindly indicate as much, as your endorsement will carry great weight.

You will observe by Senate Document 210 that the friends of the Anti-Canteen law attempted to do something along this line in the rush just before adjournment last year, but conditions which I need not detail prevented favorable action.

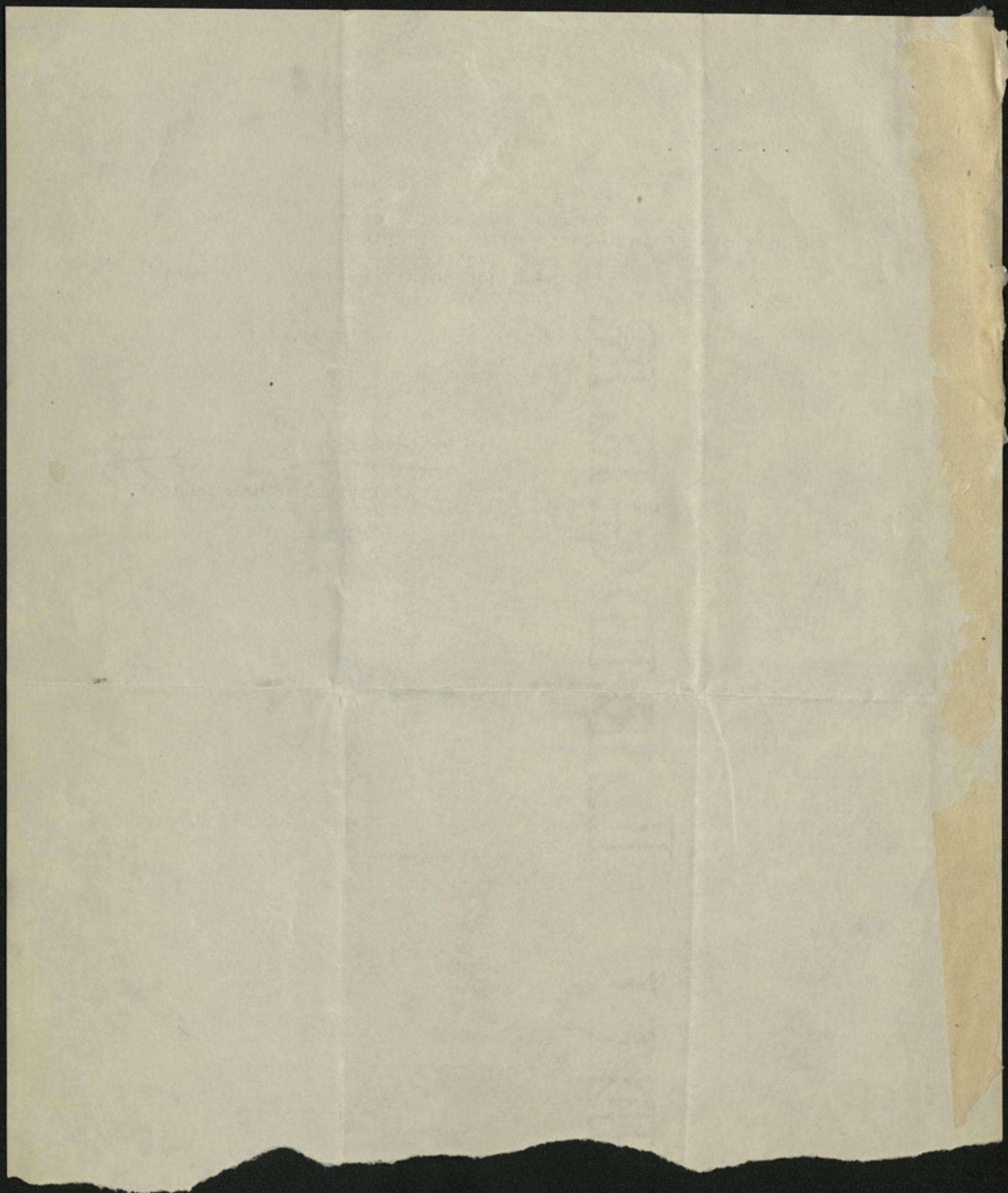
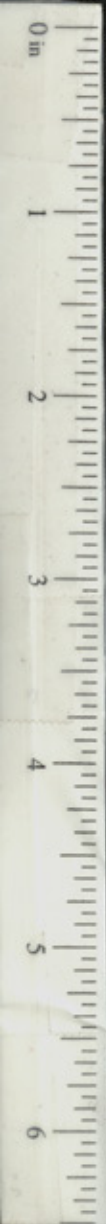
