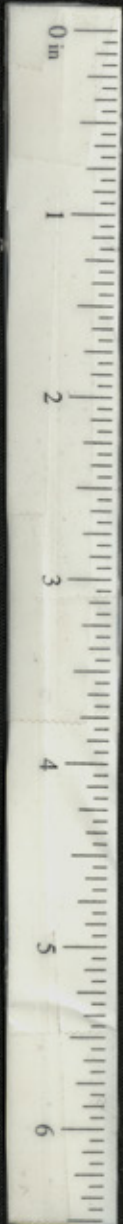

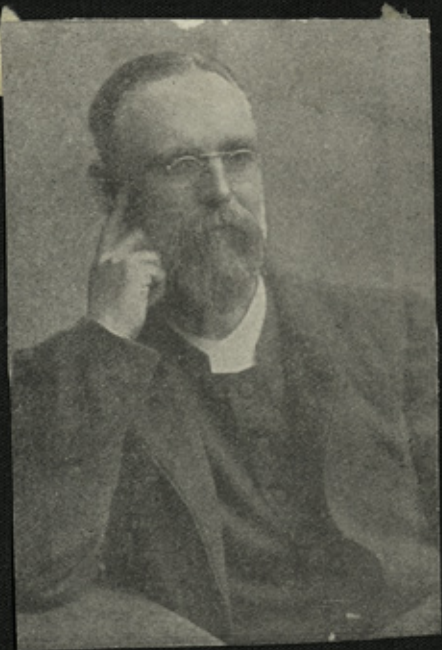
I have told

to several audiences.

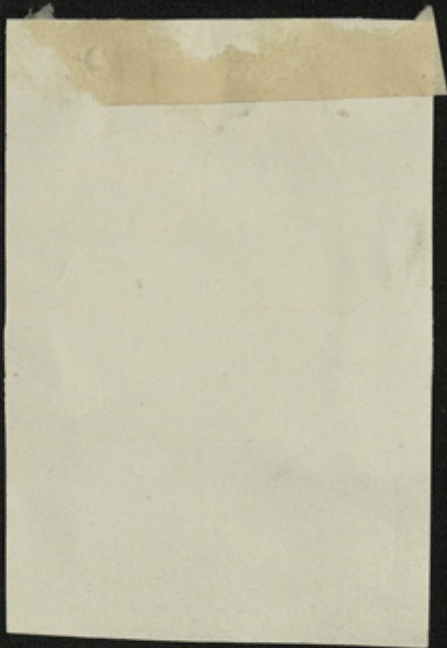
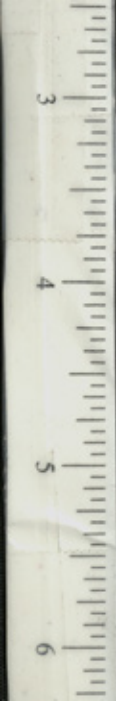
My friends and some

Yes. And this Company is hereby made the agent of the sender, without liability, to forward any message over the lines of any other Company when necessary to reach its destination.

Correctness in the transmission of messages to any point on the lines of the Company can be insured by contract in writing, stating agreed amount of risk, and payment of premium thereon, at the following rates, in addition to the usual charge for repeated messages, viz: one per cent. for any distance not exceeding 1,000 miles, and two per cent. for any greater distance.

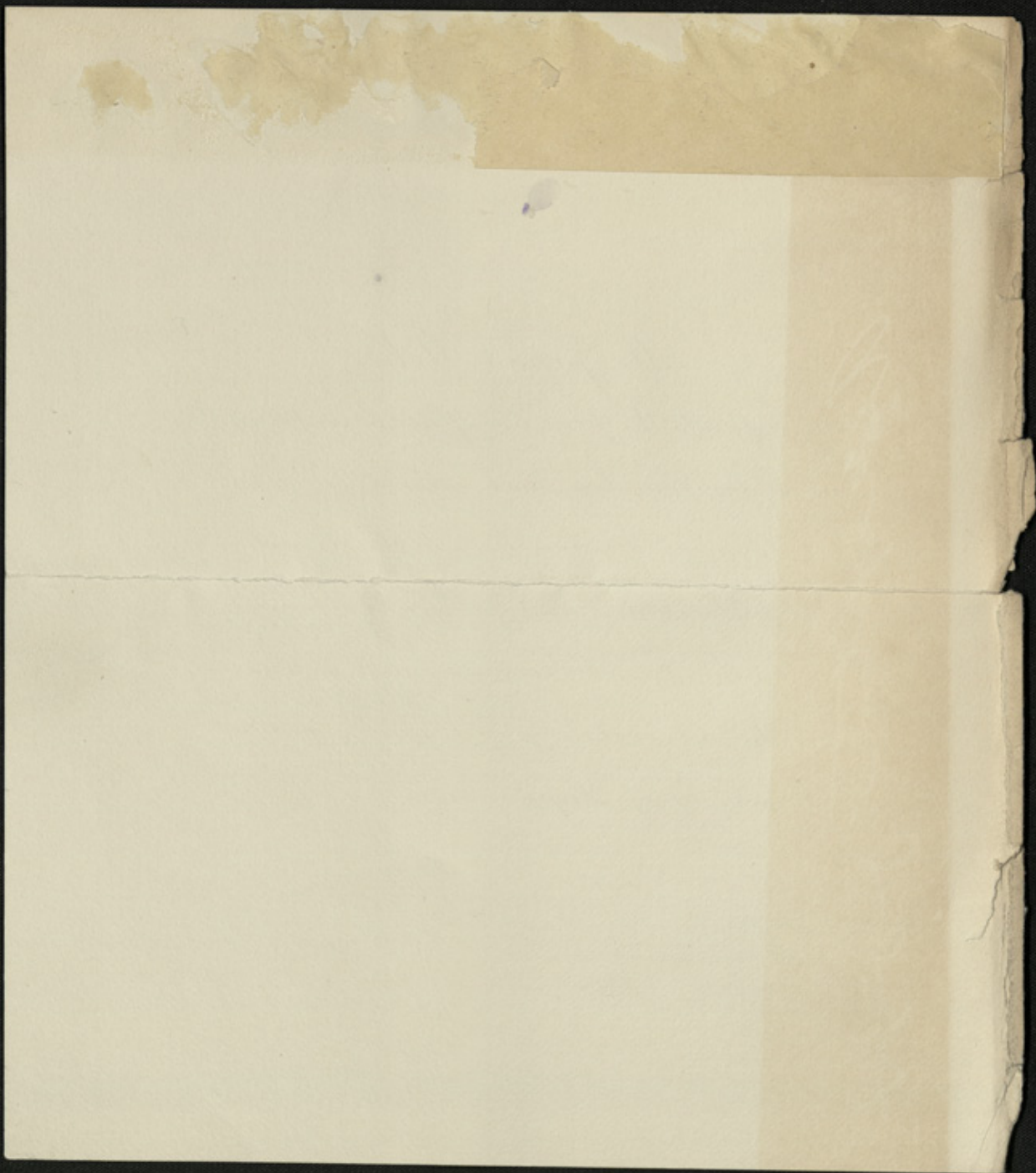
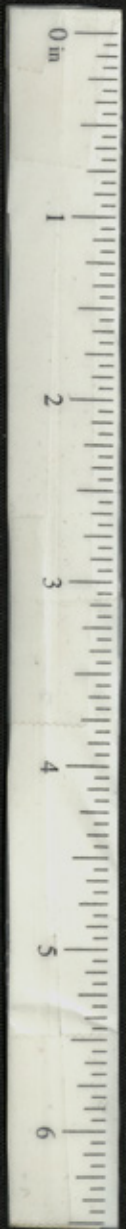

Major General O O Howard

Dear Sir

It has bin so long since
since my last personal with you that I
guess you have almost forgotten me I was
in you Company all through the Boer
Indian War I also served nearly one year in
active service at the front in the army
of the games in the trenches in front of Richmond
& Petersburg: Co A 100 Reg. Infantry New York
Volunteers ^(nine) was all hard service at the
Front. I was only 19 years of age & I came out
broken down in health. Lastly I enlisted
in battery A first Cal Heavy Artillery I served
three months & a half & by lying on the ground
at the Presidio I got swelled Varicose Veins
on the legs & scrotum. I was discharge for total
Disability, in a few months after my

Discharge I got so bad that I was sent
to the Fabolia Hospital by some Soldiers
Friends I was Conferred to undergo a serious
operation which after effort I will carry
to my Grave. I have not bin able to
make my living by Manual ^{Labour} for the
last 20 Years. I can do some light
work. for about three Years I have bin
drawing a pension of 8 dol per Month. I
applied for an Increase last Summer
H I have every reason to believe that the
board that examined me give in patch evidence
that would allow me 13 per Month but the
board of Review in Washington rejected
my claim (altogether) now I
wrote all this to Senator George B Perkins
in reply the Senator knows me personally
he writes that if I would have some Congress -
Men Introduce a Private Bill for my
relief that he will pass it through the Senate
Now I have written to day to our Representative
the Hon Victor M Wolf asking him to

Introduce a Private Bill granting me
an Increase from 8 Per Month to 30 dol
Per Month 90 dol every Quarter. now
General you know that I have not
only done faithful Service but Special
Service in or Under your Command for the
benefit of our Common Country. I now
will ask you to write a Special
letter in my behalf I direct it to the
Hon George B Perkins Recommending
that I be Granted by Congress assembled
the small amount I ask for in proportion
to my Service now General I
do not wish you to recommend in my
thing for me unless you are sure
that my Service have bin worth in your
opinion or that I am worthy a
Deserving Applicant. Should you
see fit to comply with my request
please forward your letter to me I will
send it to Senator Geo B Perkins with
two Prominent Doctors Affidavits to show
My Present Condition... I Enclose
with this letter one of your Old letters
