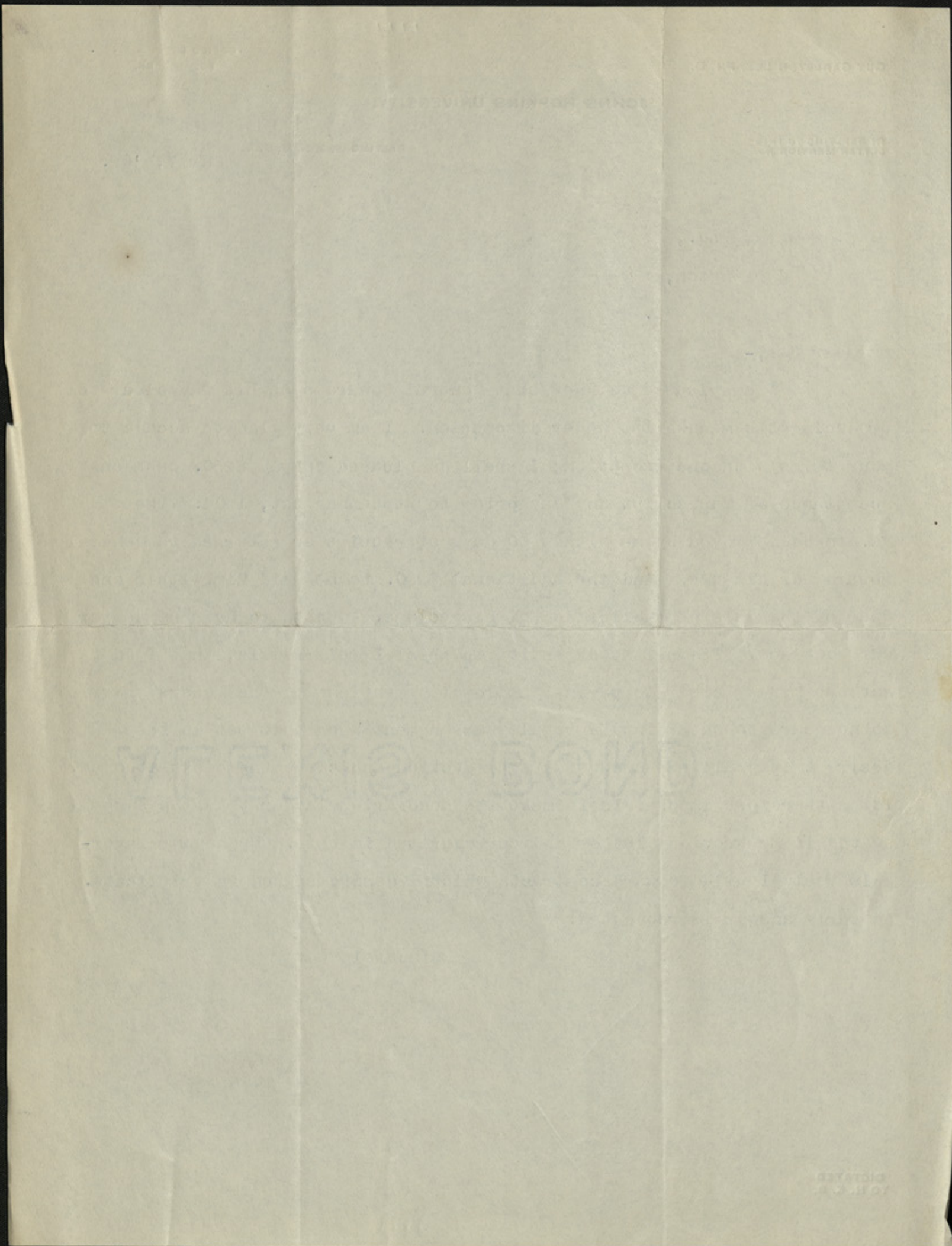
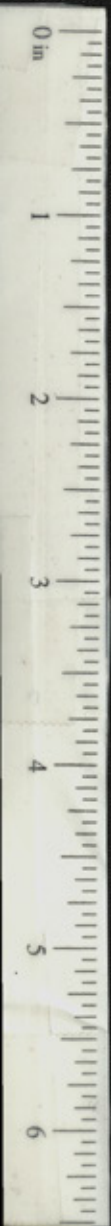
My dear Sir,-

I am pleased to know that General Howard sees his way clear to producing the manuscript under discussion. Genl. O. O. Howard;

My Dear General Howard;

May I venture to recall myself to your remembrance in view of the period during which you conducted the Bible Class at the Manhattan Congl. Church; I was in charge of the Sunday School for two years. Since that time as you doubtless know, the new Church has been built, from our designs and under our supervision; and our relations with your nephew at Mess Hering & Bowers who did the stained glass were of the pleasant. We are at present finishing the Soldiers and Sailors Monument of the Civil War, in Riverside Park, to be dedicated on Decoration Day. We trust that nothing may prevent your being present on that occasion.

My immediate purpose in writing to you is to bespeak your kind offices in a letter of introduction, if you feel disposed to favor us with them, to Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith, the military members of the Board of Army Commissioners of this city.

There are several armories to be built soon and we propose to make application to the board for the Commission as Architects. We feel that our training and experience entitle us to a hearing, provided the way to a suitable hearing can be paved by a proper introduction.

We were both graduates of the Columbia University Schools; one in Architecture, the other in Civil Engineering, complemented in one case by three years study at the School of Fine Arts in Paris, and in the other by extended experience in engineering work. Our practice has extended over a number of years; one of our first works was the restoration of the Brooklyn City Hall, and the building of its Cupola, won in competition.

If the favor we ask is within your power to grant, we shall be very grateful if you would send such letters to us to present personally.

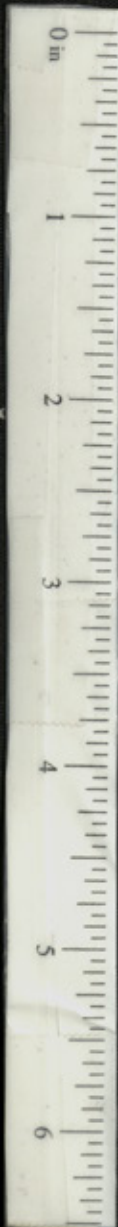
