

Lincoln's Gettysburg Address in the Publie Schools. TO THE EDITOR OF THE SUN-Sir: Several years ago it was proposed to place bronze copies of Lincoln's address at Gettysburg in the public schools, wherever the speech, in the public schools, wherever the speech, in this form, would be acceptable to the local Boards of Education. This was, at once, found to be quite in accord with an expressed desire of many Union veterans, which was unmistakable, after the first bronze was accepted and placed in a public school building. It was held by many exceptions of the Arlington Ind. March 15 1902. ing. It was held by many ex-soldiers of the war for the Union, that some expression or statement in durable form coming from them as veterans, which would briefly and accurately indicate the object of the war, and service of the Union soldier would be fitting and instructive. And it was generally acbronze placed in the public school buildings, would practically and most appropriately meet all that was desired or contemplated by the Union veteran, as a memorial of the peril and defence of the republic in his day.
