

My dear General: On the 6th of April a public meeting will be held in the City of New York at which the matter of the proposed "constructive" post exchange legislation will be discussed. We are very anxious to have some one of national reputation and whose presence will attract the public. The meeting is designed to popularize the amendments or sections we are seeking to have incorporated in the Army Appropriations bill (copies enclosed), and to which I am thankful to say we have thus far not encountered any opposition. They have met the endorsement of both friends and opponents of the canteen, but, inasmuch as appropriations of money are involved, we want the people to stand solidly back of these measures and give them the fullest approval. I may say confidentially that the President has expressed his sympathy with the general scheme involved in these propositions and thinks they are in the right line. ## (Under Quartermaster's Department)

CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF BUILDINGS FOR POST EXCHANGES:

For the construction and maintenance of suitable buildings at military posts and stations already established and occupied for the conduct of the exchange store, school, library, reading, lunch and amusement rooms, gymnasium, etc., to be expended in the discretion and under the direction of the Secretary of War, One Million Dollars.

# (Under Subsistence Department.)

Difference between the cost of the ration at twenty five cents per day and the amount of twenty seven and a half cents per day, to be issued to the Company or Detachment Commander of each Company or Detachment for each enlisted man while present for duty with his command, and to the surgeon in charge of a hospital for the sick while under his care, in the proportion of seventy five cents per month per man, to be used and disbursed by them as Company. Detachment or Hospital funds, to take the place of the funds heretofore accumulated from the profits of the canteen; this sum to be separate and distinct from funds accruing from savings in the articles of the established ration, Six Hundred and Seventy Five Thousand Dollars.


