My dear General:
On the 6 th of April a public meeting will be held in the City of New York at which the matter of the proposed "constructive" post exchange legislation will be discussed. We are very anxious to have some one of rational reputation and whose presence will attract the public. The meeting is designed to popularize the amendments or sections we are seeking to have incorporated in the Amy Appropriations bill (copies enclosed), and to which I am thankful to say we have thus far not encountered any opposition.

They have met the endorsement of both friends and opponents of the canteen, but, inasmuch as appropriations of money are involved, we want the people to stand solidly back of these measures and give them the fullest approval.

I may say confidentially that the President has expressed his sympathy with the general scheme involved in these propositions and thinks thev are in the right line. We shall be very glad to bear the expense of your trip to New York and return and your entertainment while in the city.

I hope it may be possible for you to come.
