Dear Genl. Howard.

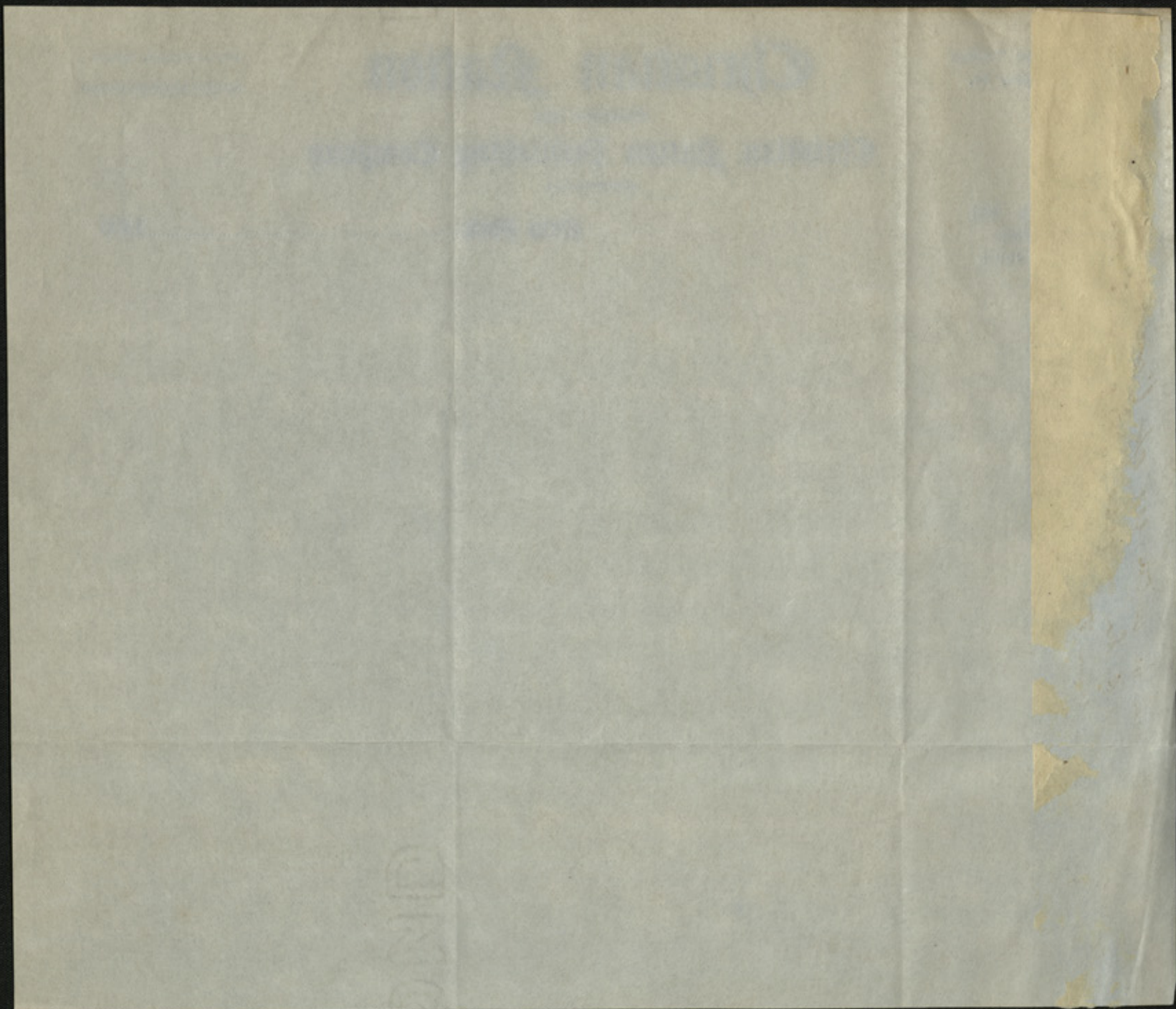
I was sorry to be late in getting to your office yesterday but could not well avoid it. I am ending by making my report in writing.

P.S. Could you be with us at Commencement this year? It would be a great pleasure to our Board to confer upon you the Doctorate of Laws, a well deserved honor.

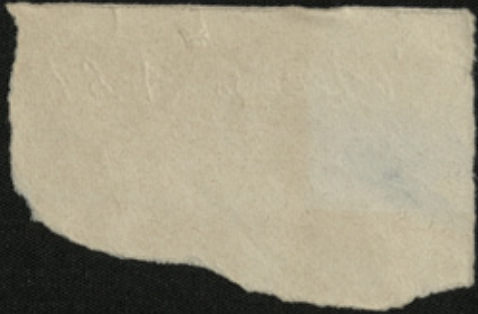
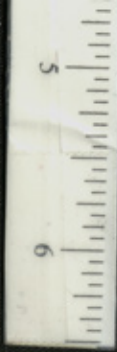

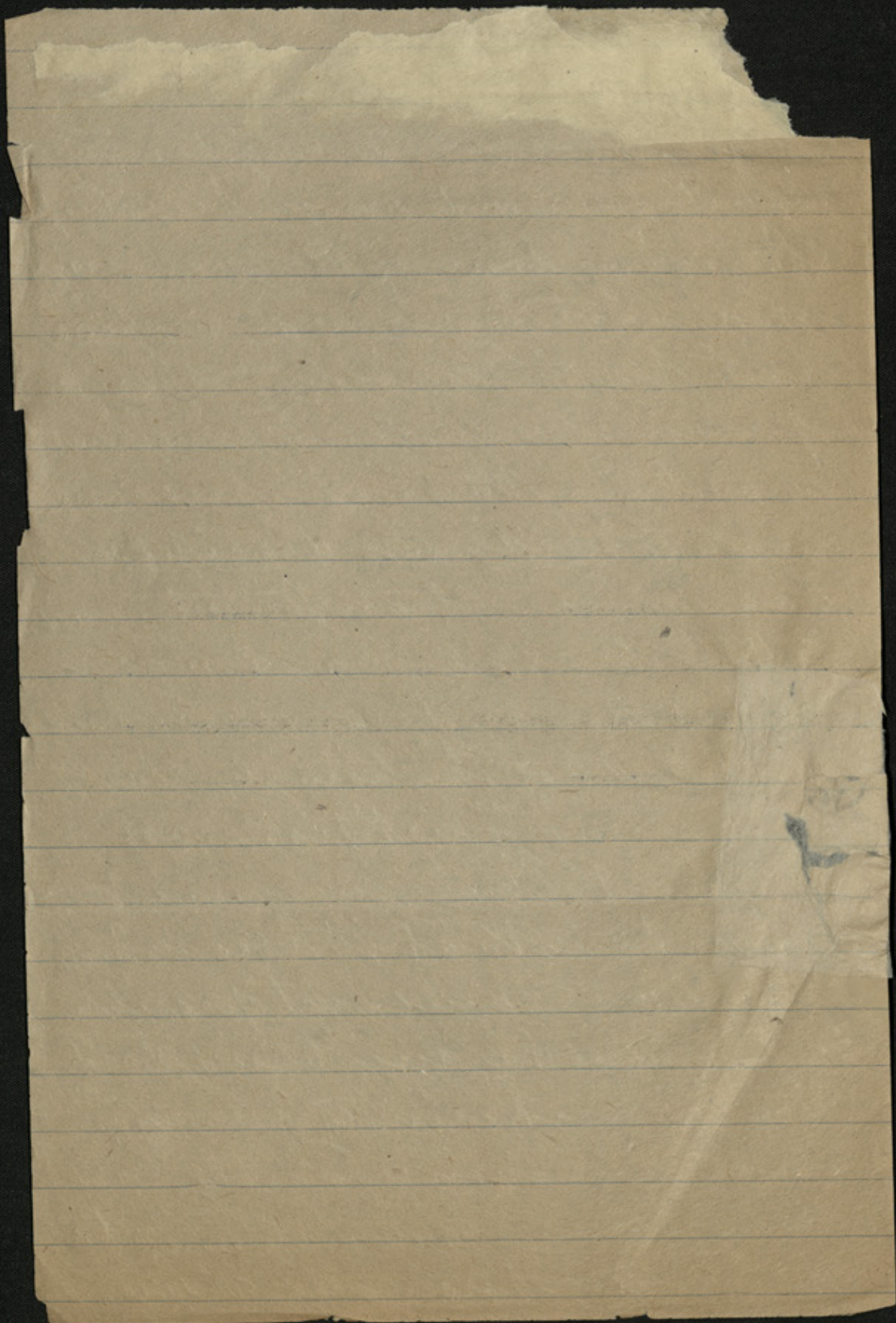
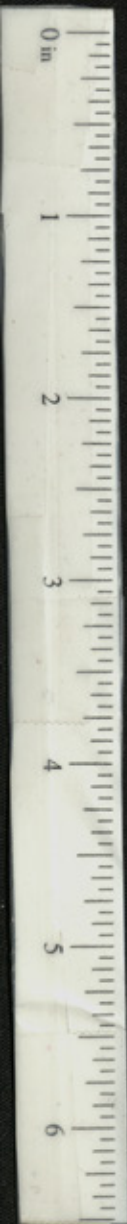
A great many

not going to say that you



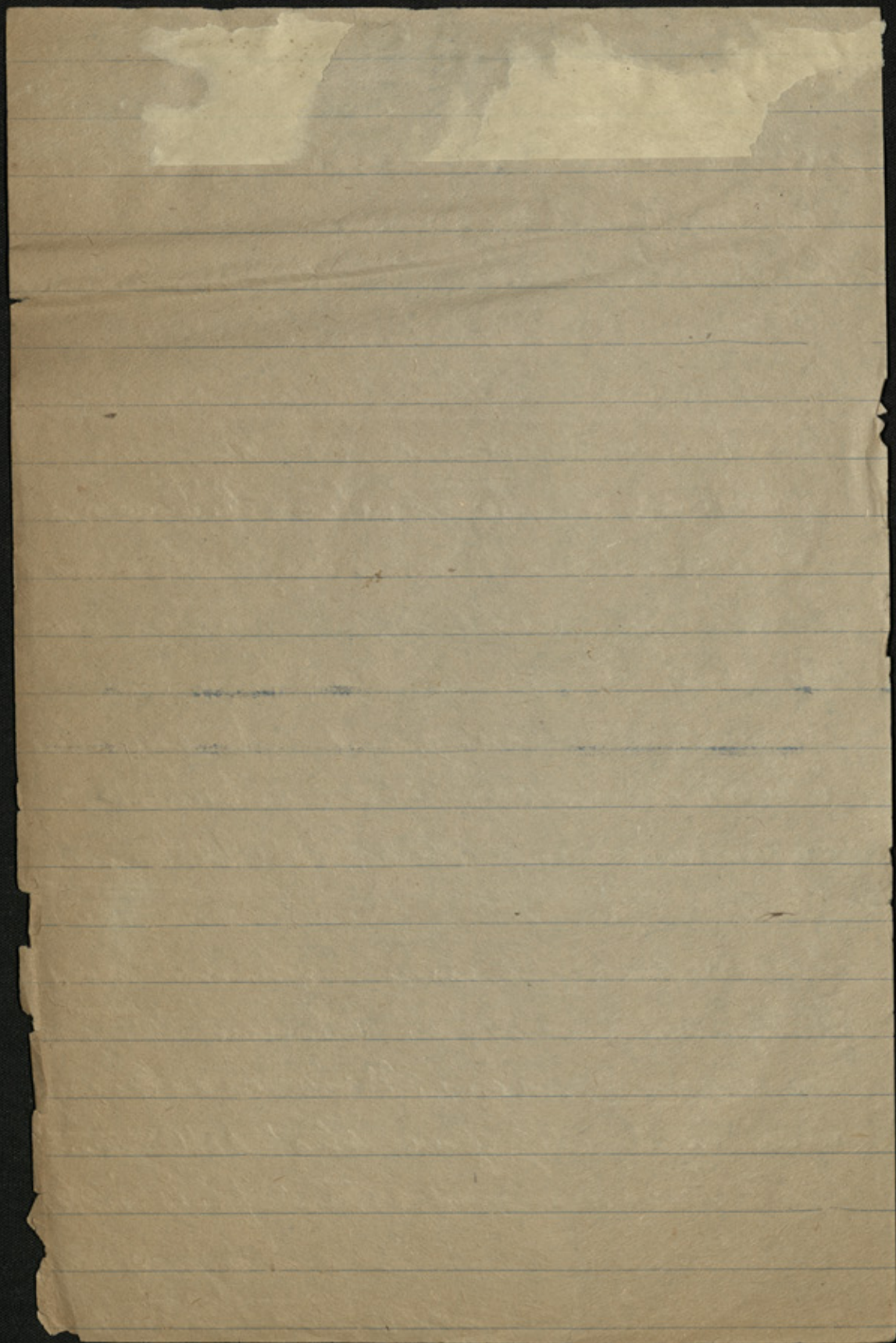
stood for war and war principles
