Dear General Howard:-

As you will see in my annual Report, which I shall send you in the course of the next two weeks, Bowdoin College is trying to raise five hundred thousand dollars to mark the beginning of its second century of work, and to meet certain urgent needs. The College has but few very wealthy alumni and friends; and three of these have recently given on an average two hundred thousand dollars each in buildings, and can not be expected to do more. I have asked each of the remaining six to give us a professorship, a gymnasium, or an equivalent contribution to the general fund. I am now writing to one hundred and fifty of the graduates and friends of the College who are either Trustees or Overseers, or are believed to have either the means to contribute themselves or influence to induce others to contribute sums of from one to ten thousand dollars each. From these one hundred and fifty men we hope to secure in contributions amounting on an average to two thousand dollars each three funds: one hundred thousand dollars for a scholarship; one hundred thousand dollars for a library fund; and one hundred thousand dollars as an addition to our general fund. May I not count you as one of the one hundred and fifty who will contribute or secure contributions to one of these three funds? The plan is to keep all gifts secret until Commencement and then announce all gifts and subscriptions together at the Commencement dinner. I hope you will be with us on this occasion



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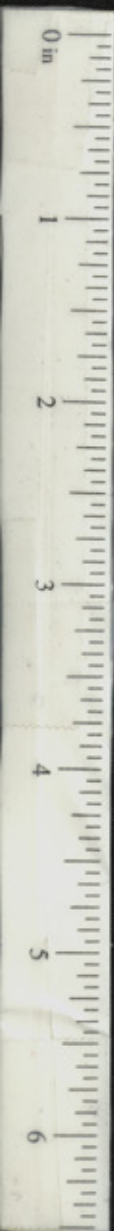

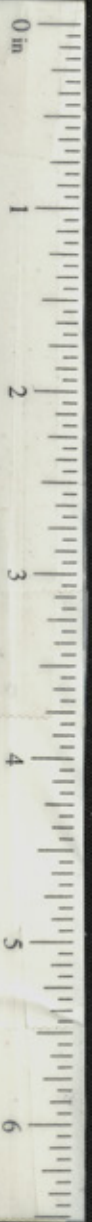


I had intended to write you before this in regard to the missing chapters of your father's monographs; those that were lost while he was traveling in the Levant, or while he was at Constantinople.
