

My Dear Sir and Comrade ,

I have been trying to see you this winter and call your attention to a certain matter , that it seems to me you are not aware of ; but whenever I found out that you were in the City , my time was engaged and I could not take the time to meet you .

I wrote you before upon a financial matter regarding what is an abuse of the Trust funds of the Society , but having called the attention of the Managers and Executive Committee to the facts , the responsibility rests with them and I am not specially called upon to say any thing more ,until the exposure comes ,when it will be in order for me

to remark " I told you so "? As a Life Director of the Society , and thus one of the only owners of the institution ,I desire to call your attention to the fact, that the American Tract Society are persistently and habitually violating the law of God as well as the laws of the State , by keeping their building open on the Lord's Day for business, and this for purposes of This matter is becoming known and it will not be long begain !! fore a public exposure of this state of things will be made , and it seems me that you cannot afford to have your good name connected with any such No matter what sort of stetements may be made as to what thing ? is required by the Fire Department , or that the elevator is run in order to furnish transportation for the family of the Janitor; and these things were gravely stated by an officer of the Society , as the reasons for keeping the building open for business on the Lord's Day ; the FACT remains that it is known that it is done, and that other buildings owned by men who simply do not set themselves up as special guardians of the Sabbath , compel their buildings to be closed during the entire time of the Lord's Day , and the building owned and controlled by the American Tract Society , is open and their employees are deprived of their Sabbath simply to allow the building to be kept open for the tenants , who do not keep the Sabbath Day holy !

The other day in going out in the cars ,I heard two gentlemen talking over the Sabbath desecration of the railroads , and one said to the other "What can you expect from a railroad, when a religious company like the American Tract Society , break the Sabbath , every week , right along?" and the answer of the other man was very significant , especially as he is connected with a big newspaper, so that I say this is getting

noised around and trouble OUGHT to come from it !!

I respectfully protest to you as the Executive head of the Society , against such desecration being further allowed , and ask that if you are not fully informed about it , that you post yourself , from outside witnesses and thus KNOW what is being done to make the name of the Society a by word and hissing !!

Dear General Howard:-

As you will see in my annual Report, which I shall send you in the course of the next two weeks, Bowdoin College is trying to raise five hundred thousand dollars to mark the beginning of its second century of work, and to meet certain urgent needs. The College has but few very wealthy alumni and friends; and three of these have recently given on an average two hundred thousand dollars each in buildings, and can not be expected to do more. I have asked each of the remaining six to give us a professorship, a gymnasium, or an equivalent contribution to the general fund. I am now writing to one hundred and fifty of the graduates and friends of the College who are either Trustees or Overseers, or are believed to have either the means to contribute themselves or influence to induce others to contribute sums of from one to ten thousand dollars each. From these one hundred and fifty men we hope to secure in contributions amounting on an average to two thousand dollars each three funds: one hundred thousand dollars for a scholarship; one hundred thousand dollars for a library fund; and one hundred thousand dollars as an additionato our general fund. May I not count you as one of the one hundred and fifty who will contribute or secure contributions to one of these three funds? The plan is to keep all gifts secret until Commencement and then announce all gifts and subscriptions together at the Commencement dinner. I hope you will be with us on this occasion

to share in what we trust will be a general rejoicing.

I send you the above letter, which I am sending to all our friends, not so much to urge you to any efforts additional to what you are always making on our behalf; but simply to let you know how things are going and what we are trying to do.

Herewith I enclose a letter directed to you as President of the Society. Possibly you may not wish to keep it, but will return it for our files.

We have no contracts or leases with any of our tenants by which they can claim attention on the Sabbath day, and nearly a month ago I notified our agent that the use of the building must be reduced to the minimum that necessity would allow. 
