Assured that your coming to Ossining will very materially stimulate interest and action in our building canvass

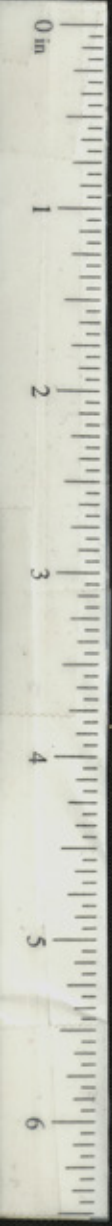
