In response to your communication (without date) recently received, relative to the claim of the widow of Captain J. I. Wilson, late of the 36th Illinois Infantry, now pending on appeal under docket No. 75443, you are advised that the papers in the claim have just been received from the Bureau of Pensions, and that the appeal will receive early consideration.

In the appeal, and also in your recent letter, you state that you have additional evidence tending to show that Captain Wilson's death was due to his military service.

You are advised that the appeal will be considered in the light of the evidence in the case when it was adjudicated by the Commissioner of Pensions.

New and additional evidence should be filed with the Commissioner of Pensions, who has original jurisdiction in pension cases.

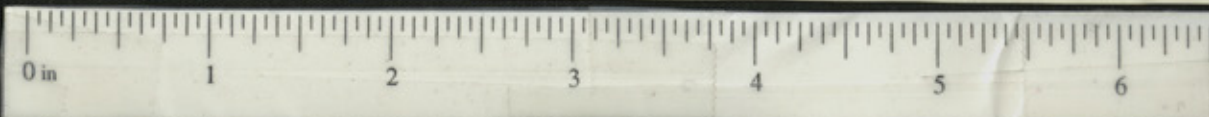

I remember correctly -
brought to you by some
of your Subordinates of
the Freedmen's Bureau,
during the confinement
of Mr Stanton, Secy of War,
to prevent the succe-
sion of Adj Gen Thomas
to the Dept as Secy of War
and interim, and during
the impeachment trial
of the late President Andrew
Johnson. It was either
late in the month of
March or early in April
1868. I was called to the
Dept of War on that nig-
ht, about 10 o'clock, by
request of Gen John A. Tolan
on whose staff I was

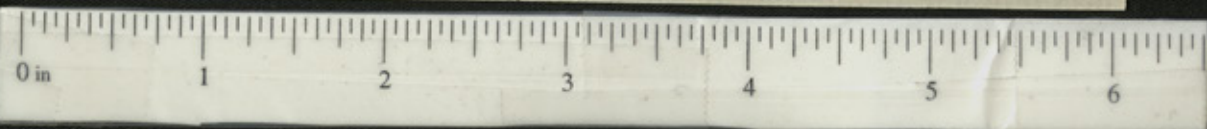

Serving as Asst. Adj't. Genl.
in Charge of the Office of
Adj't. Genl. of the G.A.R., to
give information concern-
ing the available mem-

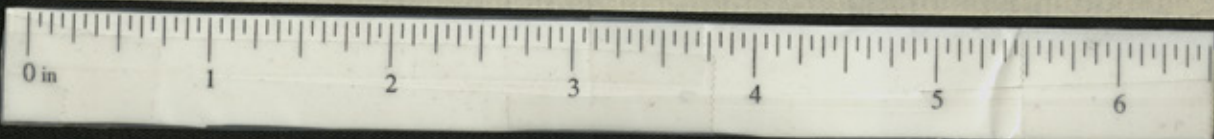

I reported to Gen. Wm.
Emory, then Commanding
the Military Dept of D.C.,
Every night and with
him frequently visited
the Secy of War, where we
usually found Gen Grant
and other distinguished
officers and Senators and



representatives in Congress.

I had preserved quite full memoranda of those events till in the destruction of my office - Nov 21, 1885, at Grand Forks North Dak., by fire, I lost a portion of the memoranda.

I am preparing an article on the subject concerning incidents, never before published, on that subject.
