I know Doctor Grant very well. I shall see him next week, or the week after, at Bar Harbor, where I am going to join Mrs. Brooke, who is now there.

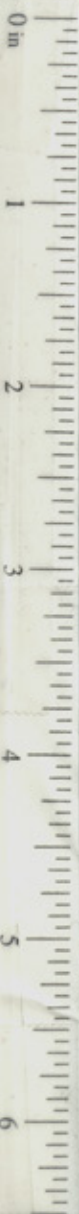
