
Mrs. Wilson has been in and shows me a letter from the Pension office, saying that the Secretary of Interior has affirmed the decision of the Bureau. I suppose that this means that an appeal is refused. Some mention is made of the document having been sent to you. This means th at Secretary of Interior simply read over the report of the Bureau without having anything new from us and concluded to refuse the appeal. I await with interest the document that has gone to you, as it is signed, I suppose, by the new Commissioner Ware.

I think the thing now for you to do at your convenience, would be to go in person to Ware, taking with you the new affidavits. some six or eight in all. Two are from two reputable physicians who had not before testified and who had personal charge of the Captain. One of them is a member of the Loyal Legion; the other, a grand army man who saw service in Arkansas, the very department where Captain was so ill. Commissioner Ware certainly will not refuse to consider these two affidavits from veteran surgeons, which have never been to the Pension office before.

Some of the other affidavits are much stronger, especially that of Dr. Beebee who gives his reasons and quotes from medical authority for believeing that typhoid fever would naturally and often does affect the hearing and is a great strain upon the nervous system.

If you say so, I will send all the affidavits now to you so that you can take them whenever you are going through Washington or if you think best to go on on purpose. I would suggest that you make an appointment before hand with Commission Ware so as not to fail to see I think in the pressure of his political campaign, Senator Mason him.





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
