Dear Brother:-
Mr. Wilson has been in and shows me a letter from the Pension oppice, saying that the secretary of Interior has affirmed the decision of the Bupesu. I sumpose that this means that an anpeal is refused. Some mention is made of the document having been sent to you. This means th at Secretary of Interior simply read over the repont of the Bupesu without having anything new from us and concluded to refuse the appeal. I await with interest the cocument that has gone to you, as it is signed, I suppose, by the new Commissioner Ware.

I think the thing now for you to do, at vour convenience, rould be to go in nerson to Ware, taking with you the new affidavits, sore six or eight in all. Two are from two rerutable physicians who had not hefore test,ified and who had nersonal charge of the captain. One of them is a nember of the Loyal Legion; the other, a grand army man who save service in Arkansas, the very department where Captain was so i11. Cormissioner ware certainly vill not refuse to consider these two afficavits Prom veteran surgeons, which have never been to the pension orfice before.

Some of the other affidavits are much stronger, especially that of mr. Beebed who gives his reasons and quotes from madiosl authority for believ fing that typhoid fever would natimally and often does affect the hearing and is a great strain upon the nervous system. If you say so, I will send all the affidavits now to you so that you can take them whenever you are going through Washineton or if you think best to go on on purnose. I would suggest that you make an appointment before hand vith commission Ware so as not to fail to see him. I think in the pressure of his politioal campaign, senator Mason
probably did not see Mr. Ware.

Your first advance to me was $\$ 50$ and I think you handed me the $\$ 150$ later in money. These two items make the $\$ 200$. put the whole of the money received into parnphlets, articles such as that in the Independent, and into board and travelling expenses and did the best I could, making some forty addresses for the Chinamen, and am very sorry that I succeeded so poorly in securing justice.
