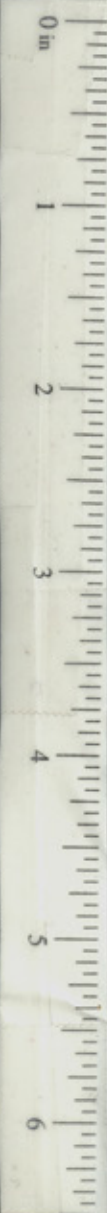

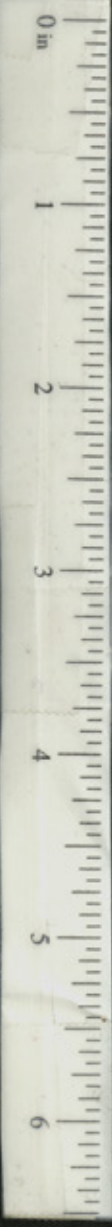

We will leave the selection of the topic to you, but would like to have you let us know before hand what the line of your thought will be.

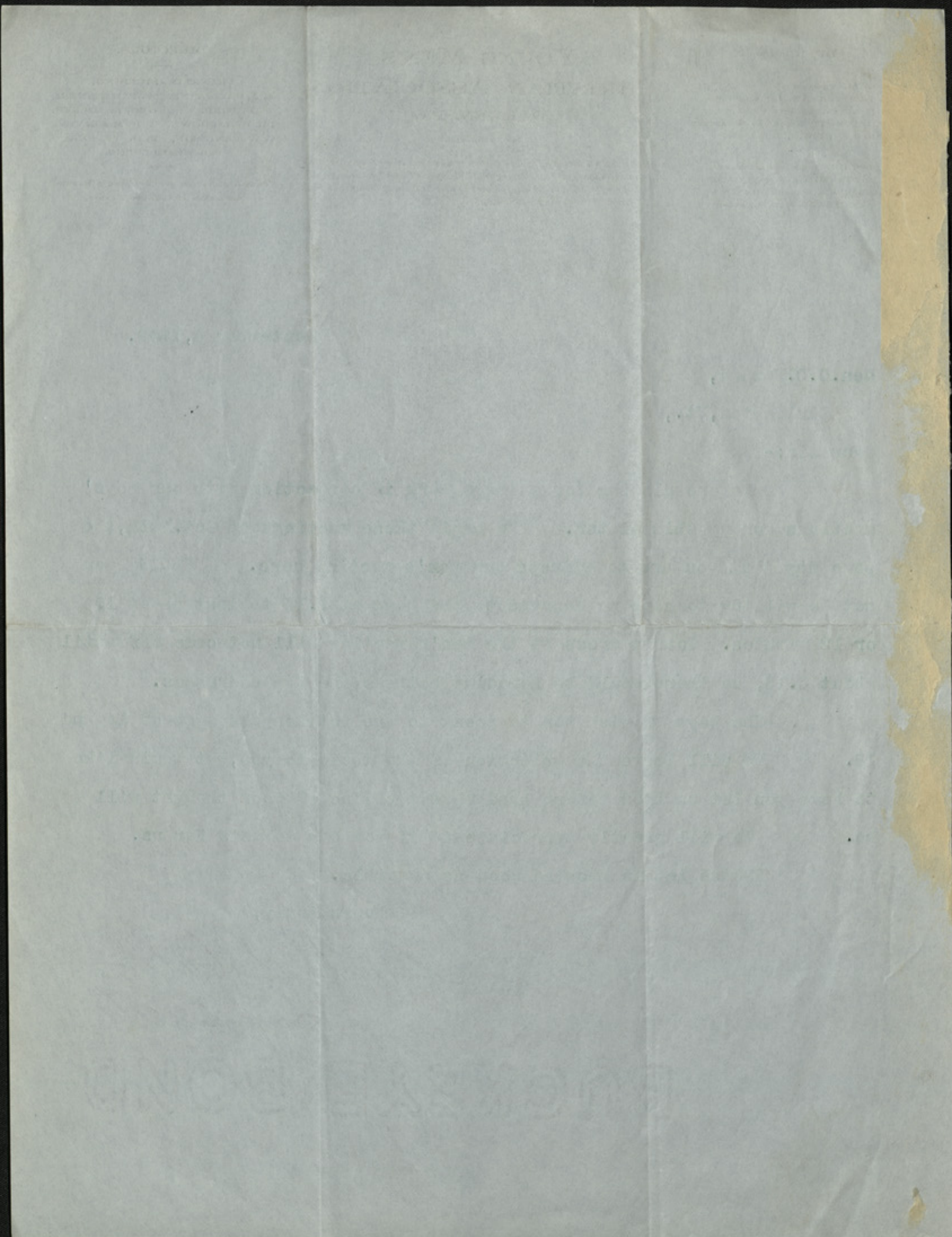
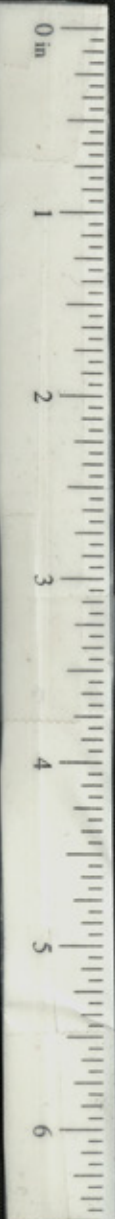


My dear General:

Perhaps my name  
has escaped your memory or recollection  
by reason of your coming in contact with  
so many people, if so, permit me to state  
an incident of some ten years ago while  
you were on a tour through this section  
towards Brownsville. I was at that time  
Mexican Consul in charge at this place  
& had the honor to accompany you from  
Fort Ringgold to Camargo, Mexico and  
thence to San Miguel. The terminus of  
the Matamoros Road where you continued  
your trip in the special train that was  
in readiness for you at said station.

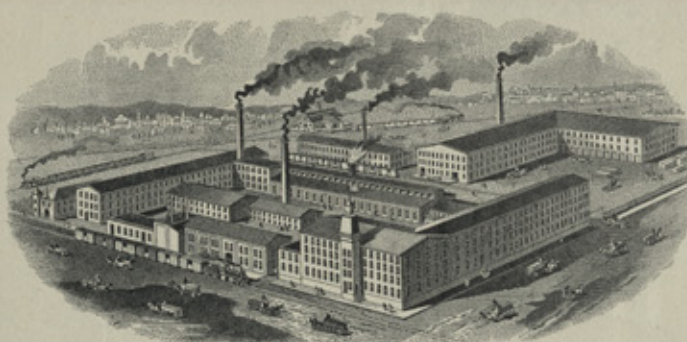

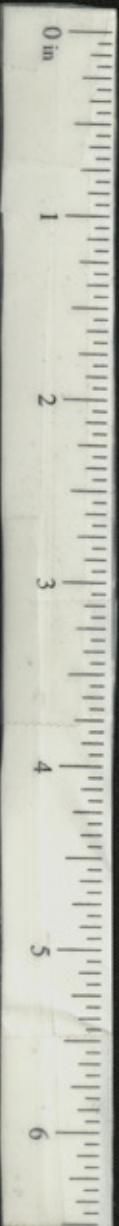

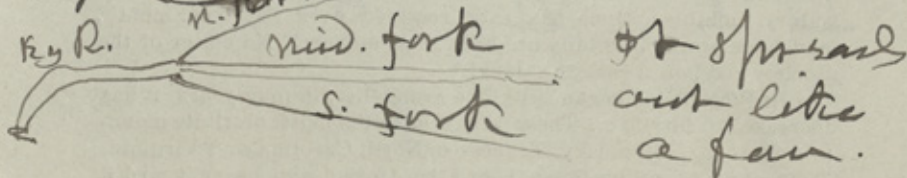
