I am in receipt of your favor of the 20th inst..

I don't believe Congress would look with favor on amproposition to allow us to keep hoth medals. I am not disposed to go on record in favor of the proposal. It seems to me we should choose between the old medal and the new one; this privilege I suppose belongs to us. I returned my old medal before receiving the new one.
