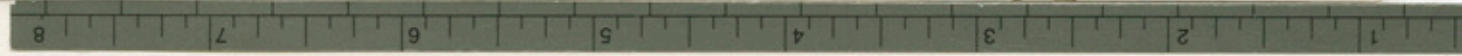

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MEMORANDUM as to the Department of the East:-

The Military Department of the East was created by G.O.2, A.G.O., Jan. 3, 1863, with Headquarters in New York City; Major General John E. Wool assigned to command. General Wool was retired on Aug. 1, 1863.

Major General John A. Dix then assumed command, and relinquished it in the summer of 1865.

By G.O. 118, A.G.O. June 27, 1865, Major General Joseph Hooker was assigned to command the department, with headquarters at N.Y. City. He assumed command about that time. He relinquished command in March 1866, at which time the department was discontinued and merged into the Military Division of the Atlantic, with hqrs. in Philadelphia, Major General George G. Meade, commanding.

In August 1866, the Div. of the Atlantic was abolished, the Dept. of the East again constituted, with hqrs. in Philadelphia, Major General Geo. G. Meade in command. In Dec. 1867, Major General Meade relinquished command and the Dept. was commanded from Dec. 1867 to July 1868 by Brevet Maj. Gen. Thomas W. Sherman, Col. 3rd Arty., with hqrs. in Philadelphia. General Sherman continued in command until July 1868, when Brig. Genl. Irwin McDowell was assigned to command, with hqrs. in N.Y. City, (G.O. 44, A.G.O. July 13, 1868). In Dec. 1872 Brigadier General McDowell relinquished command, and was succeeded by Major General W.S. Hancock, Maj. Gen. Hancock died Feb. 9/86, and was succeeded by Maj. Gen. Schofield, who assumed command Apr. 13/86 and relinquished it in Dec. 1888.

Major General Oliver C. Howard assumed command Dec. 12, 1888; relinquished command Nov. 8/94.

Major General Nelson A. Miles assumed command Nov. 20/94; relinquished command Oct. 4/95.

Major General Thomas H. Ruger assumed command Oct. 4, '95; relinquished it Apr. 10/97.

Major General Wesley Merritt assumed command April 10/97; relinquished it May 19/98.

Brigadier General Royal T. Frank, U.S.V., assumed command May 19/98; relinquished it June 30/98.

Brigadier General Geo. L. Gillespie, U.S.V., assumed command June 30/98; relinquished command Oct. 4/98.

Major General Wm. R. Shafter, U.S.V., assumed command Oct. 4/98; relinquished it Jan. 7/99.

Major General Wesley Merritt assumed command Jan. 7/99; relinquished it May 10/1900.

Major General John R. Brooke assumed command May 10/1900; relinquished command on retirement July 21/02.

Major General Arthur MacArthur assumed command July 21/02; relinquished it Nov. 8/02.

Major General Adna R. Chaffee assumed command Nov. 21/02; still in command.
