EXTRACTS FROM THE FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

OUR GREAT OBJECT.

Our desire and aim is to multiply ministers of a particular sort, truly converted men, called of the Holy Ghost to preach the Gospel; men of ability and culture; men of broad eatholie faith and liberal spirit; men opposed to all narrowness, intolerance and exclusiveness on the one hand, and to the extravagances of rationalism and ritualism on the other.

Men who know and love the simple truths of the Gospel, and have the wisdom,

grace and courage to preach them without fear, and at any sacrifice.

I. MEN WHO ACCEPT THE BIBLE AS THE SOLE RULE OF FAITH, who submit their minds to its dictation alone, who will not teach as necessary to salvation, anything which they do not read therein, or cannot prove thereby; men who take their faith from the Bible, test every doctrine by the Bible, and honor the Bible above all other books; men who will take heed to their ordination yow, "to be ready with all faithful diligence to drive away from the Church all erroneous and strange doctrines contrary to God's word,

2. MEN WHO WILL PREACH JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH IN CHRIST ALONE, who put nothing between Christ and the lost soul-neither Church nor sacraments-human efforts nor works--but present a personal Saviour in all the fulness of His character and completeness of his work, and bid men "believe and live

3. MEN WHO WILL PRESENT CHRIST AS THE EXCLUSIVE HIGH PRIEST OF OUR PROFESSION—the One Sacrifice for sin; the One Altar upon which all our offerings must be laid; the One Mediator between God and man; the one ever living Intercessor and Advocate with the Father, and look upon the Ministers of the Gospel as Ambadassors of Heaven-Heralds of God, sent forth to proclaim

pardon, peace and eternal salvation through Christ alone.
4. MEN WHO REGARD THE CHURCH OF CHRIST AS THE BLESSED COMPANY OF ALL FAITHFUL PEOPLE. Who love all who love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth; men who are thoroughly loyal to, and cordially love our Church, and yet are free from that spirit which would call down fire from

heaven upon those who follow not with us.

Men who find the great cardinal doctrines of the Gospel in the Prayer Book, shining there as so many gems in a casket of jewels—their lustre now, alas too often obscured by the many false interpretations which are put upon our admirable service, and the constant neglect of the clear light which is thrown upon it by our Articles of Religion.

The multiplication of such ministers is our great desire, prayer and aim. Could

we have a more noble object before us?

One more calculated to inspire enthusiasm, zeal and perseverance in work? One that bears more directly and largely upon the welfare of man and the glory of God?

MEN CAN BE SECURED.

Such men are to be found; we have sent nearly an hundred into the Ministry already; we have nearly an hundred more upon our roll. Many others are applying - to us for aid. They have little or no means; should they be kept out of the Ministry on this account? Our government freely and generously supports those who are preparing to lead her armies to victory. Shall we be less wise and fiberal? Should the cadels of Annapolis and West Point be abundantly provided for, and those who are soon to become ouncers in the Army (the Lord be alto other neglector) or even stinted in their position? Verily, the pildren of the world are use than the children of light.
