Articles of agreement entered into this Thirty-first day of December, in the year of our Lord, one thousand, eight hundred and ninety-two, between Francis P. Fleming, Governor of the State of Florida, John L. Crawford, Secretary of State, William B. Lamar, Attorney-General, Eduardo J. Triay, Treasurer, and Albert J. Russell, Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State of Florida, and by virtue of their said offices, constituting the State Board of Education of the said State of Florida, of the first part, and Francis Irsach, of the City of New York, State of New York, and his associates, parties of the second part.

Witnesseth, that the said parties of the first part, as such Board of Education, in consideration of the payment of the sum of One Dollar per acre, or One dollar and twenty-five cents per acre, as hereinafter set forth, for all the lands now unsold in said State of Florida, known as Seminary lands, hereby agree for themselves, and their successors, to sell and convey by good and sufficient deeds, conveyances and assurances to the said parties of the second part and assigns, all of the said lands known as Seminary Lands in said State of Florida, upon the terms hereinafter set forth.

The parties of the second part in consideration of such conveyances, agree with the said parties of the first part to pay for said Seminary lands at the rate of One Dollar per acre in case payment is made in full for all of said lands within six months from the date hereof, or at the rate of One Dollar and twenty-five cents per acre for all of said lands in case payment is made in full within twelve months from the date hereof.

It is further agreed that the title to all of said Seminary lands shall remain in said State Board of Education until payment is made in full for all of said lands within six months or twelve the salesman of said lands shall sell and convey to actual settlers on said lands, and to parties desiring to purchase the same, and of said lands at current prices, and to deposit the moneys arising from said sales with the Treasurer of said Board of Education, and when payment is made in full by said parties of the second part, as hereinbefore set forth, the moneys arising from such sales shall be considered a part of the payment to be made by said parties of the second part.

And, it is further agreed that in case of default on the part of the parties of the second part in making the payment in full within the times before stated, then this contract and all rights thereunder, shall be void and of no effect.

The Salesman stated that he had received the following proposition from Capt. Francis Irsch of New York City, to purchase all of the Seminary lands in Florida upon the following terms; that he Francis Irsch, would buy all of the lands belonging to the Seminary Fund and pay at the rate of \$1.00 per acre for the same within six months from this date, and if the full payment could not be made within six months, he would pay at the rate of \$1.25 per acre for all of said lands within twelve months from this date; in the meantime, the salesman of said lands should sell to all actual settlers and to other parties applying for said lands, any of the same at current prices, and the money so received should go into the hands of the Treasurer of the State Board of Education, and in case full payment was made by said Irsch for all Seminary lands within six or twelve months, as above mentioned, the moneys so received by the State Treasurer should be applied as a credit on the purchase of said Irsch, and in case the said Irsch failed to make full payment for all of the Seminary lands in Florida within twelve months, that the contract to be entered into with said Irsch to be void and of no effect. Upon motion, the proposition of Capt. Irsch to buy said Seminary lands was accepted, and the Salesman directed to notify him of its acceptance, and to prepare the contract to be signed by Capt. Irsch.

Copy of Revised Statutes State of Florida, 1892:
Relating to State of Board of Education the sale of Lands etc.
pages 178-179 Paragraphs 234 and 235:

234. State Board of Education:- The State Board of Education shall consist of the governor, the Secretary of State, the Attorney-general the State treasurer and the State superintendent of public instruction. The governor shall be the president, The State Treasurer shall be the treasurer, and the State superintendent of public instruction the ^{Secretary} treasurer of said board. Said board is a body corporate, with full power to perform all corporate acts for educational purposes.

235. Power and duties of State board:- The State board of education are directed and empowered:

First:- To obtain possession of and take the charge, oversight and management of all lands granted to or held by the State for educational purposes, and to fix the terms of sale, rental or use of such lands, and to do whatever may be necessary to preserve them from trespass or injury, and for their improvement.

Second:- To have the direction and management, and provide for the safe keeping and expenditure of all the educational funds of the State with due regard to the highest interest of education.

Third:- To entertain and decide upon questions and appeals referred to them by the State superintendent of public instruction on any matter of difference or dispute arising under the operations of this act, and to prescribe the manner of making appeals and conducting arbitrations.

Fourth:- To remove any subordinate officer in the department for incompetency, neglect of duty or other cause which would disqualify a person for the appointment.

Fifth:- To keep in view the establishment of schools on a broad and liberal basis, the object of which shall be to impart instruction to youth in the profession of teaching, in the knowledge of the natural
