
After General Howard examined the ground, he concluded the only tenable position for his limited force was Cemetery Hill, but as a temporary measure to relieve the increasing pressure on the 1st Corps, ordered his first division (Barlow) and third division, (Schimf) to seize and hold Oak Ridge, on the right of the first corps. It appears he had the triple purpose in mind of developing the confederate strength; protecting the town, and holding back Lee for Meade's Army to assemble at Gettysburg. The occupation of the ridge was then feasible. No considerable confederate force at this time, about 12, was in sight. A confederat brigade, a battery or two, covered by a line of sharpshooters, was the extent of the confederate force there at hand. But really a movement was only practicable as future developments will show, for the purpose mentioned, all of Lee's strength present was at that time unknown to the Union Generals. General Schurz's idea about posting the corps was in thorough keeping with Howard's original idea, General Howard having left the detail to his able mind. He directed the third division to deploy on the right of the first corps in two lines, and his first division to form on the right of the third; the second brigade (Ames) to be en echelon behind the right of the first brigade. Then with Dilger's and Wheeler's batteries to the front, he advancedtoward the ridge. He further requested a brigade of the second division to be posted near the railroad depot, in readiness to charge in force, should the confederates move on the right. But in Schurz's temporary absence from that point, Barlow, eager to charge, moves his division forward past the Poor House, driving Doles skirmishers off and occupyCopy of Extracts. See letter to J. 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But as there was no opposition at that early stage, it is useless to speculate what the result might have been, if this or that had been formed here or there; guesses do not win victories, but after the battle any one can fight it over, point out the mistakes and win a brilliant victory every time.

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Towards sunset on the sightsenth of January, 1893, several officers and men belonging to the little garrison of Fort Wood on Bedloe's Island in New York Harbor, were skating on the ice that had formed all the way to the New Jersey shore. As it grow later the officers and men took off their skates and went back to the island as it was near the first call for Retreat, the final robb call of the day. But one officer remained, Lieutenant Frank Daniel Webster, Sixth Infantry, U. S. A. With him the young son of the Commanding Officer of the Post, Alexander Maccomb Wetherill, a boy fourteen years of age. Scattered about on the ice were three or four young children belonging to the Light House employe s and further out toward the Mational Docks could be seen the figures of a man and woman walking on the ice. The man was walking toward the woman, having accomplished the object for which he had gone out, viz., - to be able to say that he had walked from Bedloe's Island to the Mational Bock. He was Mr. Charles Miller, an enginear in the Light House establishment., and the woman was his wife, to whom he had been married about a month previous .

As his wife drew nearer he is horrified to see her suddenly sink through the ice, and, thinking of nothing but her rescue, flies to her assistance, breaks through the ice and in an instant both are struggling in the water; - the current is swift, the ice crumbbes on the edge as they try to throw themselves upon it. Lieutenant Webster and Macomb Wetherill are skating some three hundred yards away from the island and about one hundred yards from the imperilled man and woman; Mac., as the boy is called, discovered them and at once raised an abarm, and bioutenant Webster, who was not far away, hastoned to the scene. Realizing the danger of approaching the edge of the treacherous ice Lieutenant wabster first threw his overcoat to the man thinking that before it should become saturated with wate water, it might aid in keeping him afloat, and then lay down upon his face and soized the woman by the hand, instructing Mac watheribb to hold him securely by the feet; the ice at this time seemed to be sinking and the rescuers were in imminent peril. In the meantime several soldiers of Company "A. " Sixth United States Infantry, who had heard Macs outery, were running to the rescue. Among them were Privates Leroy S. Hotchkies and Dennis Guiney who carried ropes, and Charles F. Rodenstein, who had the good judgment to provide himself with a board. Hotchkiss at once fearlessly exchanged places with Lieutenant wabster, grasping the hands of the almost paralyzed woman, the board was placed beneath her, a line was formed and she was dragge unconscious from the water.

While this was being done Private Guiney had thrown the rope in the form of a noose over the head of the man, who was so helpless that he could not use his hands to hold it, but held it with his teeth, and he also, was drawn out of the water; the rescues being effected as the ice was sinking under the feet of the rescuers.


