wife of Lieut. F. B. Andrus, U. S. A., And Daughter of Major Wm. H. Powell, U. S. A.

Mrs Andrus was born June 13th, 1864, while her father was with the 4th Infantry, in the arduous campaign of the Army of the Potomac from the Rappahannock river to the front of Petersburg; and at the close of the war, when barely seven months old, she began following the fortunes of her father with his company and has never left it, except while away at school.

As a child she was bright beyond her years; as a maiden she was pure truthful and sincere; as a woman she was without reproach; as a wife she was devotion itself; and as a daughter she was all that a father or mother could hope for—sweetness, loveliness and charitableness being the component parts of her nature.

Giving birth to a fine boy on the night of October 31, 1886, Mrs. Andrus was, two days afterwards, attacked with puerpal fever, from which she never recovered, but died almost at the same instant her baby was born, after four weeks of painful suffering.



II. The Superintendent has to make to the Officers and Cadets of the Military Academy the painful announcement of the death this morning of Private André Freis, Detachment of Army Service Men, Quartermaster's Department, assistant to the librarian.

Private Freis enlisted at this Post May 1, 1841, and was assigned to duty as assistant librarian November 5, 1844, which duty he performed satisfactorily and continuously from that time forward. He was serving his 13th enlistment, the total length of his service being 52 years and 10 months. He was known and respected by all Officers who have been graduated at the Military Academy, and by all other persons connected with it, for half a century. The superior character of his service was recognized by Congress in 1871, when in making a substantial increase in the appropriation for the salary of librarian's assistant it provided that for that year it should be paid to André Freis, and to him alone. In his death the Academy has lost a highly esteemed and valued servant.


His long career presents a spectacle of resolution in endeavor, of fidelity to trust, and of loyalty to friends which may well be emulated by us all.

Comrade Kerr has been a sufferer for years. Let all who can assemble and pay our last tribute to a brave "defender of the Republic."



The Superintendent announces with sorrow to the Officers and Cadets of the U. S. Military Academy, the death on the 23rd inst. of Mr. Francis Newlands, who for about fortyfive years was connected with the Headquarters of this Institution.

Mr. Newlands was born in Glasgow, Scotland, Nov. 24th,

1814, and came to this country in 1836.

In 1847, during the administration as Superintendent of the late General Henry Brewerton, Corps of Engineers, he entered upon the duties of the clerk in charge of the disbursements

under the immediate direction of the Superintendent.

For nearly a half century, until prevented by serious illness, this noble and generous Scotchman attended with unflagging zeal and with unswerving integrity, to the multitudinous duties devolving upon him, winning the respect and love of all with whom he came in contact, by his unfailing courtesy, his gentleness of disposition and his manly straight-forward character.

During the last twenty years of his life, he did not leave

the Post of West Point.

For a number of years he performed in the most satisfactory manner, the duties of Treasurer of the West Point Army Mess, having been the only civilian who ever held that position.

On the afternoon of the 25th inst, he was laid away among his old friends in our beautiful cemetery, and although no military salute could be rendered, just as the closing words of the burial service were being spoken, the surrounding hills reverberated with the thunder tones of the sea-coast battery, a sound he loved so well.

but he has left behind him memories fragrant with all the attributes of a truly noble character.




