I, William Shields, Private, Company "B", 21st Regiment U.S. Infantry, do hereby most sacredly pledge myself to abstain from drinking any and all intoxicating liquors in any shape or form whatsoever, from this date for the remainder of the term of my natural existence. And this abstinence from the use of intoxicating liquors I do pledge myself to adhere to not only in the letter but in the spirit of these words, of my own free will and without evasion or any mental reservation on my part, and with one and only one exception, viz: When the drinking of intoxicating liquors by me is rendered necessary by my sickness and then only when it is duly prescribed by an authorized physician.

In witness whereof I hereby subscribe my name, this fifteenth (15th) day of November, 1876.
